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Some Tuscarawas Wertmans

Without a "paper trail" we cannot prove the origins of Jacob Wertman, who moved with his family to Tuscarawas County *ca* 1855. However, we do have a descendant whose DNA test closely matches the results of other men in proven GP I lines.

Jacob Wertman was born in 1806 in Union Co., PA; then moved to Mifflin and Bedford counties before settling in Tuscarawas Co., OH, with his wife Sarah Harris. Their children who migrated with them were:

The Wertman Family Association Reunion Committee is pleased to announce the tentative schedule for the 2018 Family Reunion and Annual Business Meeting. We hope that you will make every effort to attend. Sugarcreek is a beautiful resort area in Northeast Ohio's Amish country that has many attractions.

Sugarcreek merged with Shanesville, founded in 1814 by Abraham Shane. The location was at the intersection of two Indian trails, now Ohio routes 39 and 93. German and Swiss settlers came to the heavily forested area that reminded them of the countryside and climate of their homeland. Sugarcreek became known as the center of Swiss-Cheese making in Ohio. Industry included coal mining and brick making. The Railroad arrived in 1882, increasing the population of the "Little Switzerland of Ohio."

Another Slice of Life Discovered

As a regular browser through online auction sites, I sometimes find family ephemera being offered. These pieces are not of genealogical significance, but add interest to the lists of names and dates. Questions arise, such as who, why, and what? One such item is a letter written by Lewis Franklin Wertman⁵ (1848-1909), [George Philip⁴, George Philip³, Jacob², George Philip¹].

Addressed to "Jakob Bachman, Stony Run, Berks Co., Pa.," the letter is dated 06 Feb 1896 and was posted in Mosserville, PA. It reads: "Dear Sir.

"I have a horse that is about 6 years old.

"A nice brown horse.

"A good horse.

"I have no use for him.

"I have to [sic] much.

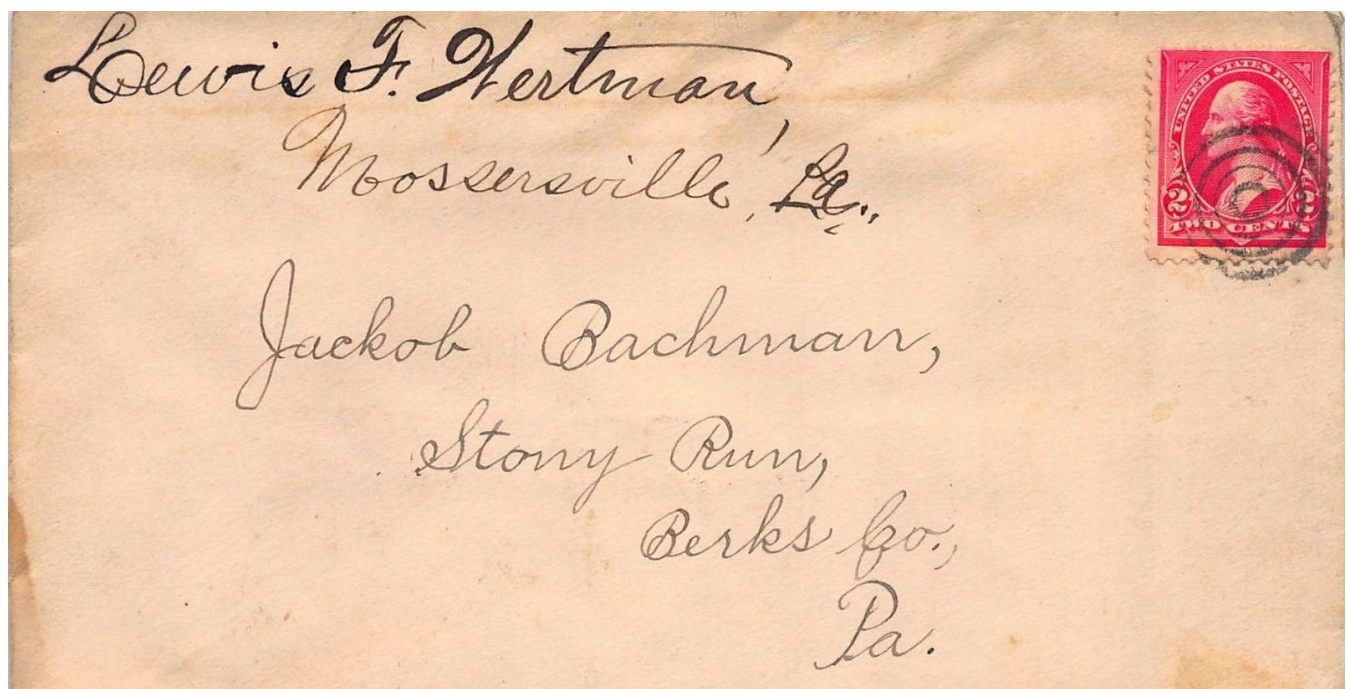
"I will trade with you for a hay rake and a Ohio Empire machine.

"That is about the end try and answer soon or try and come up.

"Yours truly,

2017 Business Meeting Minutes

Wertman Family Association Reunion, Ontelaunee Park, New Tripoli, Lehigh County, PA, 18 August 2017

The 18th annual business meeting was called to order by President Russ Dannecker at 1:01 p.m. Thirty-three members were present for the meeting.

Attendance Awards/Recognition

Vice President's Report

Hal Merz was not in attendance.

Secretary's Report

Doug Wertman asked for approval of the minutes of last year's business meeting. A motion to accept the minutes was seconded and approved unanimously.

Archivist's Report

Kathy Bucher reported that more information on Michael's line will be in the archives by next year. She also urged WFA members to scan photos of past and present generations, to label them, and to send them to her.

Treasurer's Report

Maryann Cronk reported that the WFA's balance as of 16 August 2017 was \$6,341.62, with expenses for the 2017 reunion not yet paid. A motion to accept the report was seconded and approved unanimously.

Report on Ancestry Committee and DNA Project

Tom Young reported that the Columbus, Ohio, branch is working on their line, though documentation is extraordinarily difficult to find. There will be more news in the future.

On the DNA project, Tom said that all 14 of the DNA tests done thus far are properly identified. A control group of nine are documented descendants of George Philip I. The other five match the control group, but their connection to GPI is unknown. For more details, see: www.bit.ly/wfadna.

Scholarships are still available for further DNA tests for descendants of Martin and Simon and, at the discretion of the project administrators (Tom and Russ Dannecker), for those of unknown ancestry. Tom requested approval to spend \$395 for an in-depth test on the DNA of one of the 14 people al-

ready tested. A motion to approve his request was seconded and approved unanimously.

Newsletter Editor's Report

Shirley Daniels reported that she had done two issues of the Newsletter in 2017: January and June. In addition to members, the WFA newsletter was distributed to 78 organizations. Shirley expressed her appreciation to all those who submitted articles and urged all WFA members to continue to do so, with sources.

Webmaster's Report

Kathy Bucher said she is open to all recommendations and suggestions for the website.

Nominating Committee Report

The committee (Chair Richard Daniels, Shirley Daniels, and Russ Dannecker) proposed the following nominees for WFA officer positions:

2017 Research Meeting Minutes New Tripoli, PA, 19 August 2017

Morning Session

The First Families of Pennsylvania Project – Kathy Bucher

The Lineage Society is sponsored by the Genealogical Society of Pennsylvania (GSP). There are three groups:

- Colony and Commonwealth (ancestors first arrived in PA between 1683 and 1790);
- Keystone and Cornerstone (ancestors first arrived in PA between 1791 and 1865); and
- Pennsylvania Proud (ancestors first arrived in PA between 1866 and 1900).

You can join with proof:

- identify ancestors;
- complete application form, which is for one person only;
- assemble documentation (this same documentation can be used by others); and
- pay fee.

Preferred documents are: official records of birth; marriage certificates; and death certificates. Other documents which can be used include: tax records; deeds; wills; land grants; military service records; census records; and church records.

Kathy concluded by explaining why she is talking about this and why she wants to involve the Wertman Family Association in this:

- to put George Philip Wertman I on the list of First Families of PA; and
- once one person joins, others can do so with the same documentation.

Ruprecht Family Update – Richard Daniels

The Heimbachs are direct descendants of GPWI. The Ruprechts are in Martin's line; a Ruprecht married one of the daughters of Martin.

Richard distributed to all interested a copy of a disc with Microsoft Word files on GPWI (largest file) and files on others of unknown origins.

eBay and Your Family – Russ Dannecker

Russ said that you can do research on eBay. He has found 16 Wertman pictures on eBay and has done research on the individuals; in some cases he

couldn't find many records. He has bought several things on eBay. He concluded that you should "keep on looking." Look occasionally on eBay for anything Wertman-related.

Who Are You? – Richard Daniels

Richard talked about the importance of writing your autobiography and how you write one and then discussed his own autobiography which he had written several years ago.

A Year in Review – Tom Young

Tom briefly discussed the status of the DNA project, pointing to the DNA section of the Wertman Family Association website for those interested in a more detailed discussion: <http://wertman.weebly.com/dna.html>. This website has a link to Tom's paper on what we've learned from the DNA project and a link to the 14 people analyzed (not by name).

Afternoon Session

Coming to America – Shirley Daniels

This presentation was a dialogue with Richard Daniels asking questions of Shirley, who answered them by portraying a young girl who came to America from Germany in the early 1700s. The dialogue included life in Germany, why she would want to come to America, the voyage, getting settled in Pennsylvania, getting land in Lynn Township (10 year mortgage), going to the farm, preparing the land (clearing woods), and building the cabin.

Women's Work in 18th Century Pennsylvania – Shirley Daniels

In the 1700's, husbands were advised to pick a wife who was young, sturdy, and preferably good-looking. Shirley discussed women's never-ending duties, which included:

- Helping her husband;
- Caring for her family;
- Managing the household;
- Feeding the family;
- Caring for clothing;
- Treating illnesses; and
- Networking.

He is survived by his wife of 49 years, Judith Ann Studer Strickling of Ashland; a daughter, Jenny (Rick) Ewing of Ashland; a son, Marc (Lisa) Strickling of Ashland; ten grandchildren; and two sisters, Shirley Null of Ashland and Nancy (Gerald) Johnson of Ney, Ohio.

Interment was in the Ashland County Memorial Park.

We extend our sympathy to the family of our Wertman Family Association Board Member and former WFA Vice President.

Sarah Jane Wertman, 95, passed away 20 April 2018 at Buffalo Valley Lutheran Village, Lewisburg, PA.

She was born 09 March 1923 in Milton to the late Otis and Susan Satteson Caldwell. She was the wife of William E. Wertman⁷ (William Edwin⁶, William Henry⁵, Jacob B.⁴, Daniel³, Jacob², George Philip¹), who died in 2006.

She was a lifelong member of St. Andrew's United Methodist Church, Milton, where she taught Sunday school and was the organist for 60 years, a member of the United Methodist ladies auxiliary, and had volunteered in the gift shop at River Woods, Lewisburg.

She is survived by three daughters and sons-in-law, Barbara and John Hoffmaster of Hughesville, Karen and Keith English and Sharen and Randall Coup, all of Milton, six grandchildren, and 11 great-grandchildren. She was preceded in death by a brother, Clifford Caldwell.

Burial was in Harmony Cemetery, Milton.

News Excerpts

Mansfield News, *Mansfield, OH, 26 Sep 1907*

Edward B. Wertman⁸ (Josiah Franklin⁷, David⁶, Solomon D.⁵, David⁴, George Philip³, Michael², George Philip¹), of Ashland, was run down and trampled upon by a runaway horse and badly injured. His left shoulder bone was fractured, a gash was cut in his head and he was otherwise bruised. [Edward died 28 Aug 1950.]

Star-Independent, *Harrisburg, PA, 10 Apr 1915*

Another forest fire broke out yesterday on the mountain leading from New Tripoli to Tamaqua and spread rapidly. The flames leaped across what is known as the **Wertman** road, and made it impossible for vehicles to pass that way.

The Daily Gate City, *Keokuk, IA, 14 Feb 1916*

Mrs. Anna C. Linn, a resident of the Benevolent Union home, lived in Lewiston, IL, with her aunt, **Mrs. Sarah Wertman** (Sarah Emmons), wife of John⁵ Wertman, (Simon⁴, John³, Simon², George Philip¹), in 1859, when Abraham Lincoln was a candidate for president. He came to Lewiston and stayed two days at the Wertman home. Mrs. Linn's remembrance of the man, his kindness and his simplicity of manner is very distinct.

She says Lincoln spoke in Lewiston from the court house steps, making a speech of perhaps two hours in length. The people who heard him, for the greater part, had to stand, but their interest in the speech and their love and admiration for the speaker made them forget the length of time and their weariness. She spoke particularly of remembering the swing of his long arms as he made gestures to emphasize his speech.

The Independent Record, *Helena, MT, 1 Nov 1946*

The prospective recruit was no rookie, but Maj. Harold E. Dalness hesitated. With fingers crossed, Dalness signed him – subject to physical exams. A telegram from Fort Lewis, WA, credited the Billings army recruiting station with another recruit. **Oscar L. Wertman**⁷ (Perry Sylvester⁶, Daniel⁵, Simon⁴, John³, Simon², George Philip¹) of Roundup, veteran of two world wars, was wearing khaki again – at 63.
