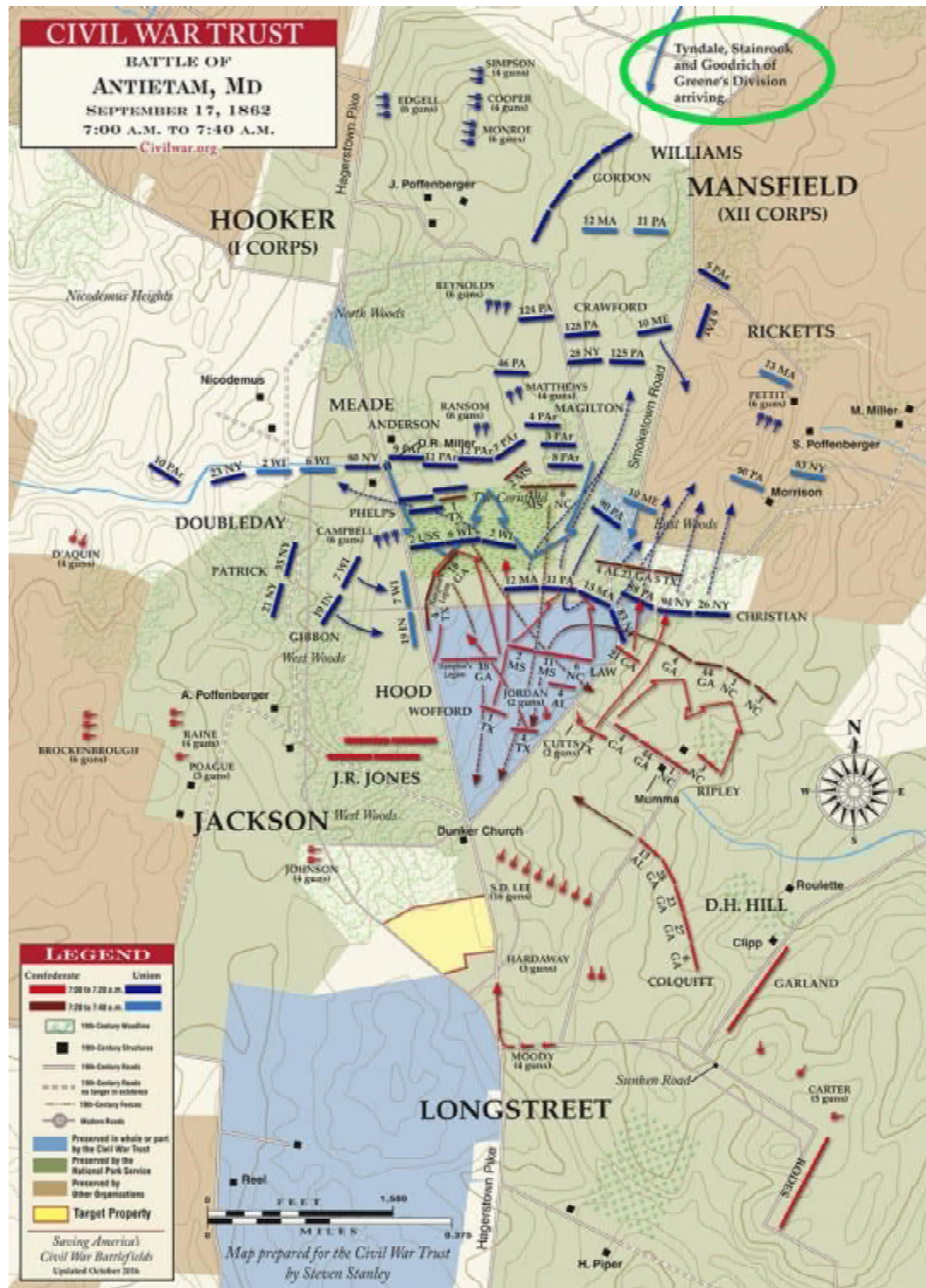

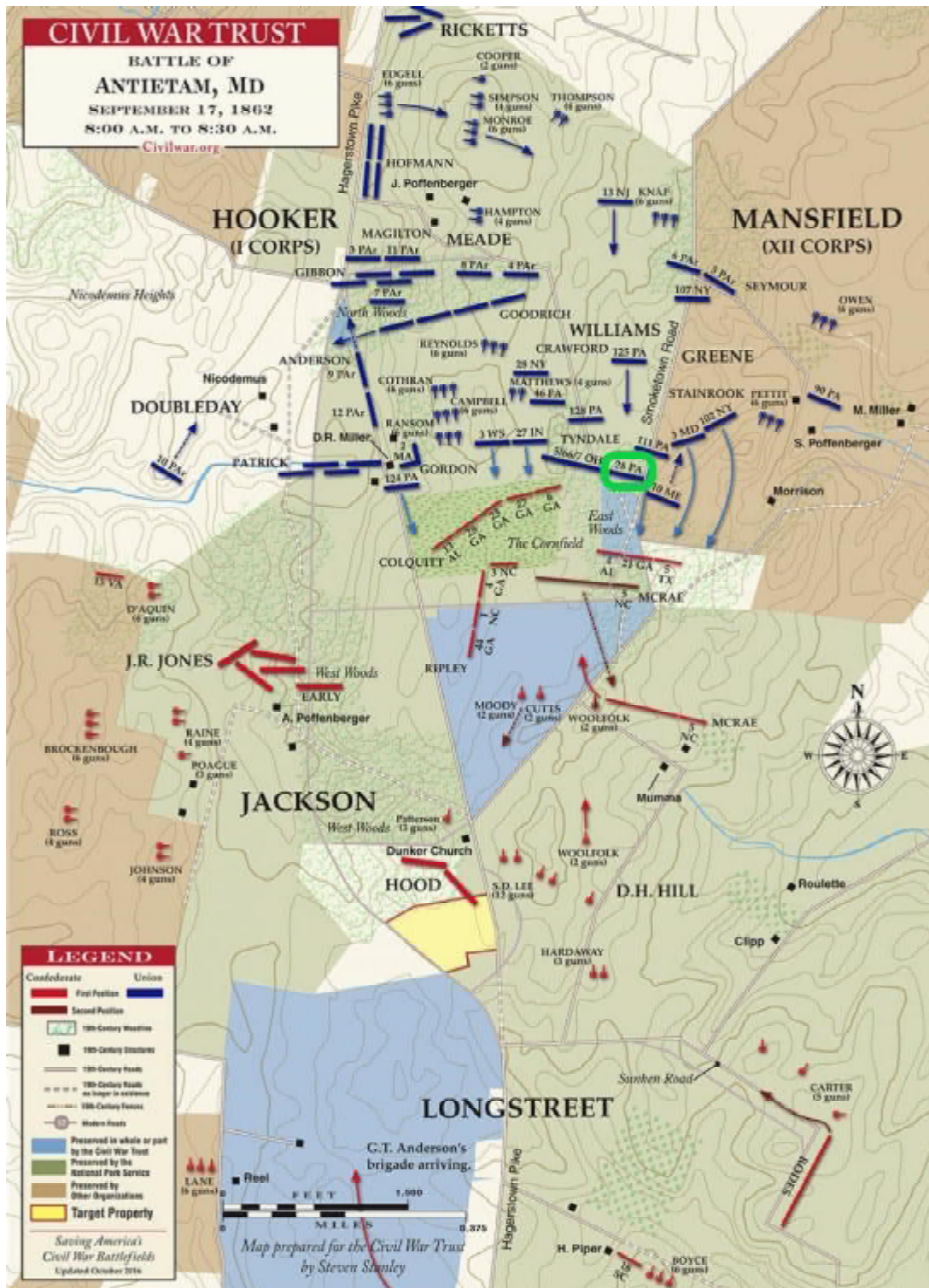

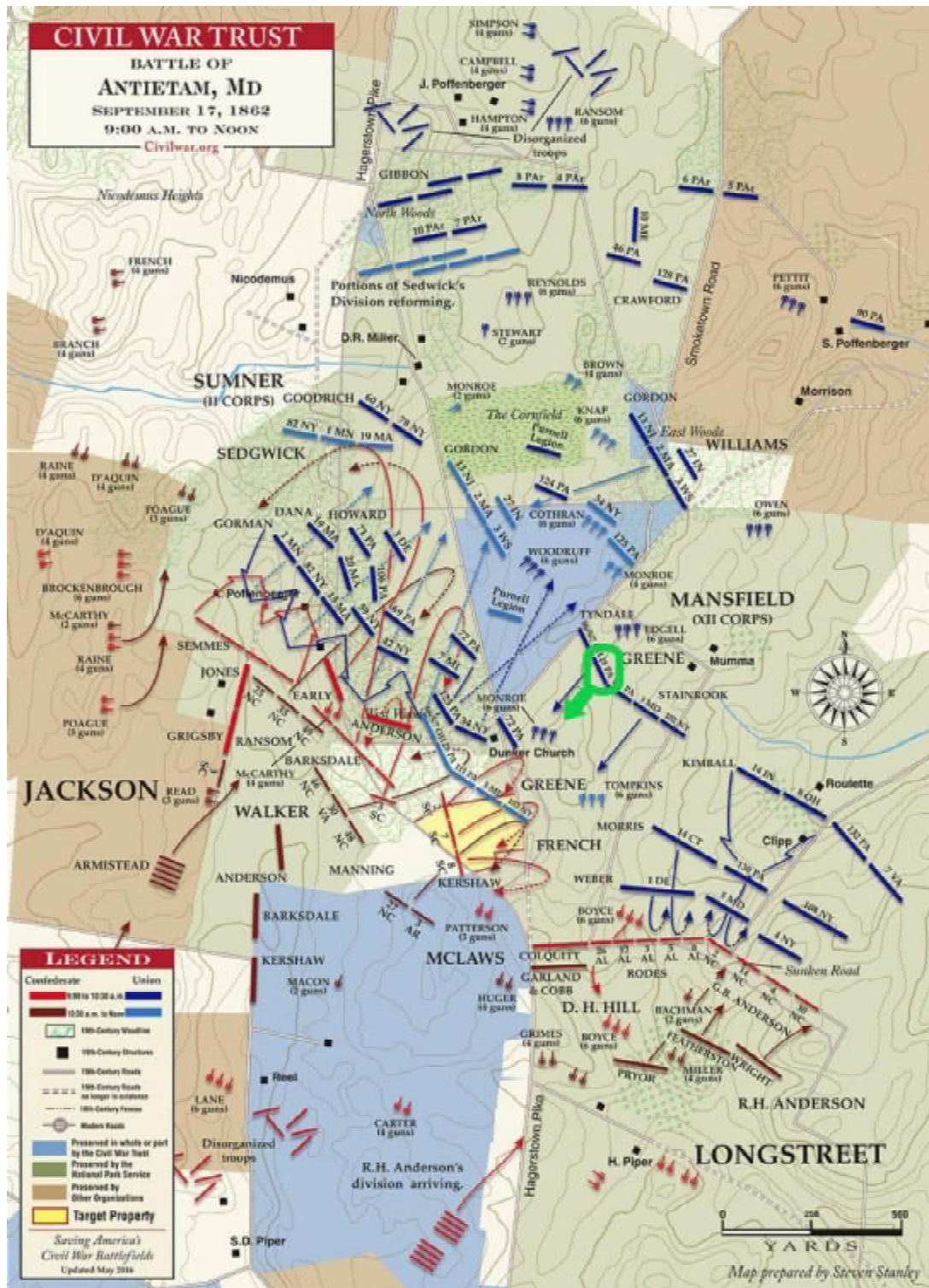
BATTLE MAP | American Battlefield Trust's map of the Battle of Antietam, Maryland on September 17, 1862

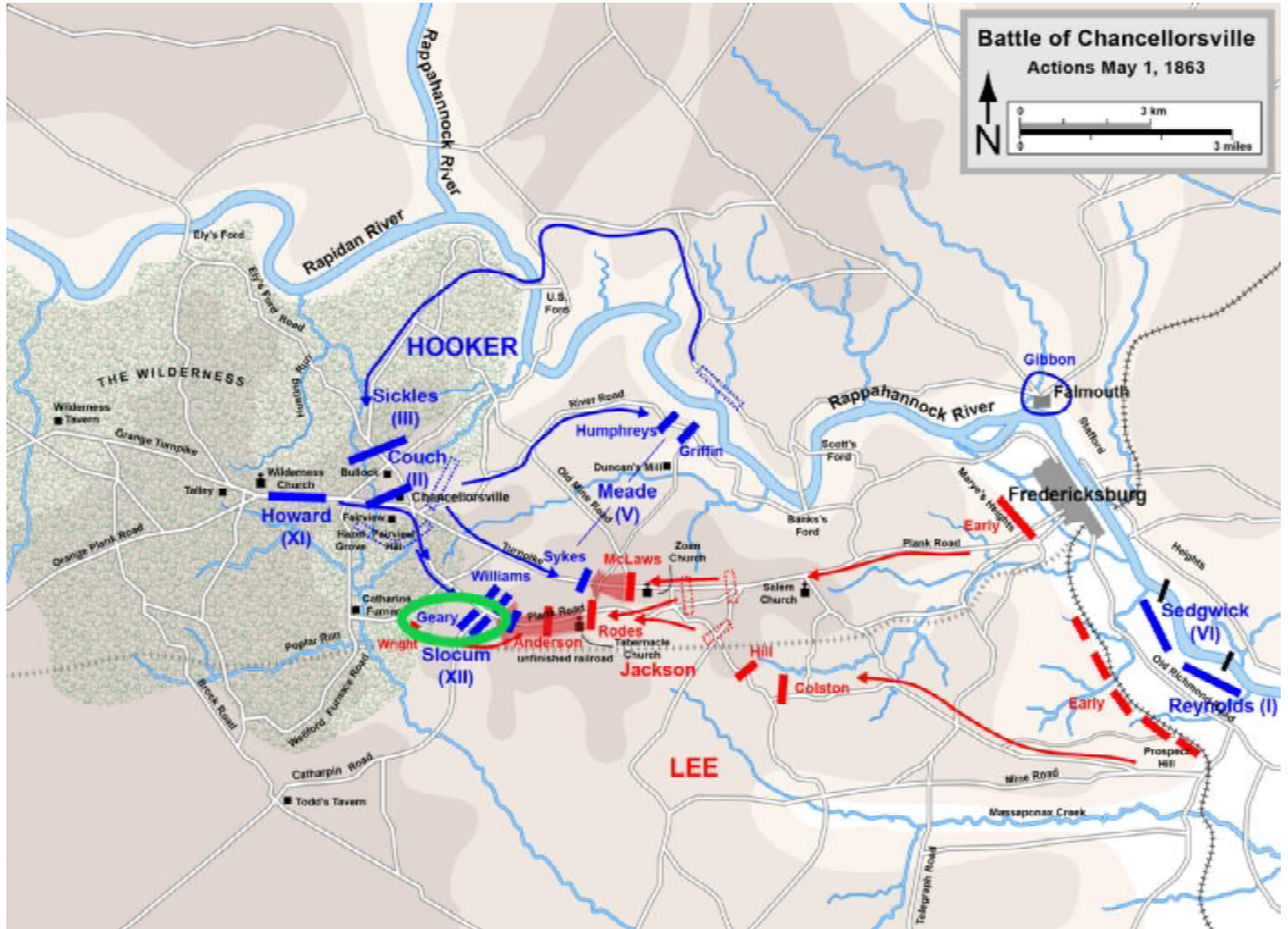


BATTLE MAP | American Battlefield Trust's map of the Battle of Antietam (West Woods), Maryland on September 17, 1862

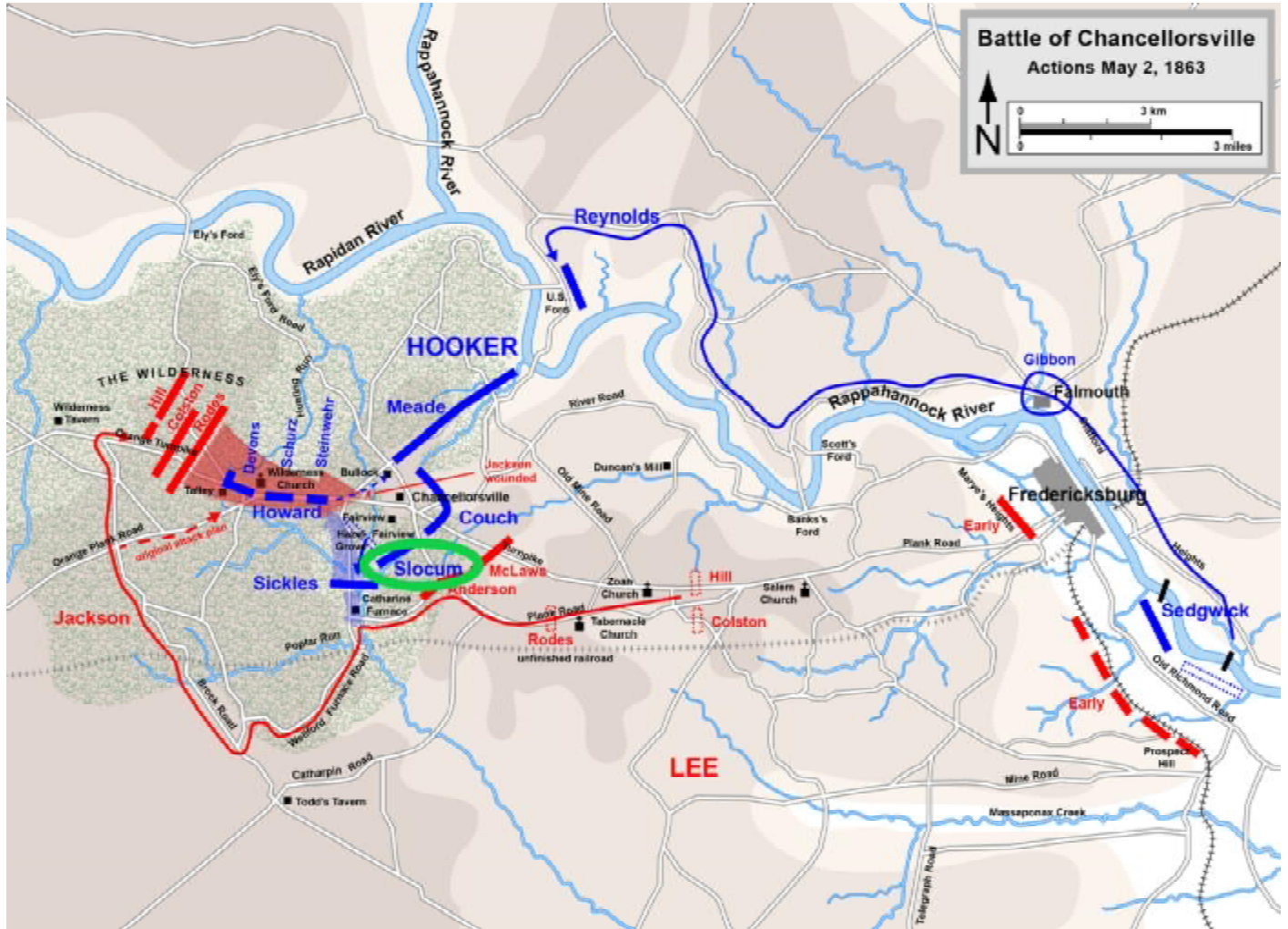




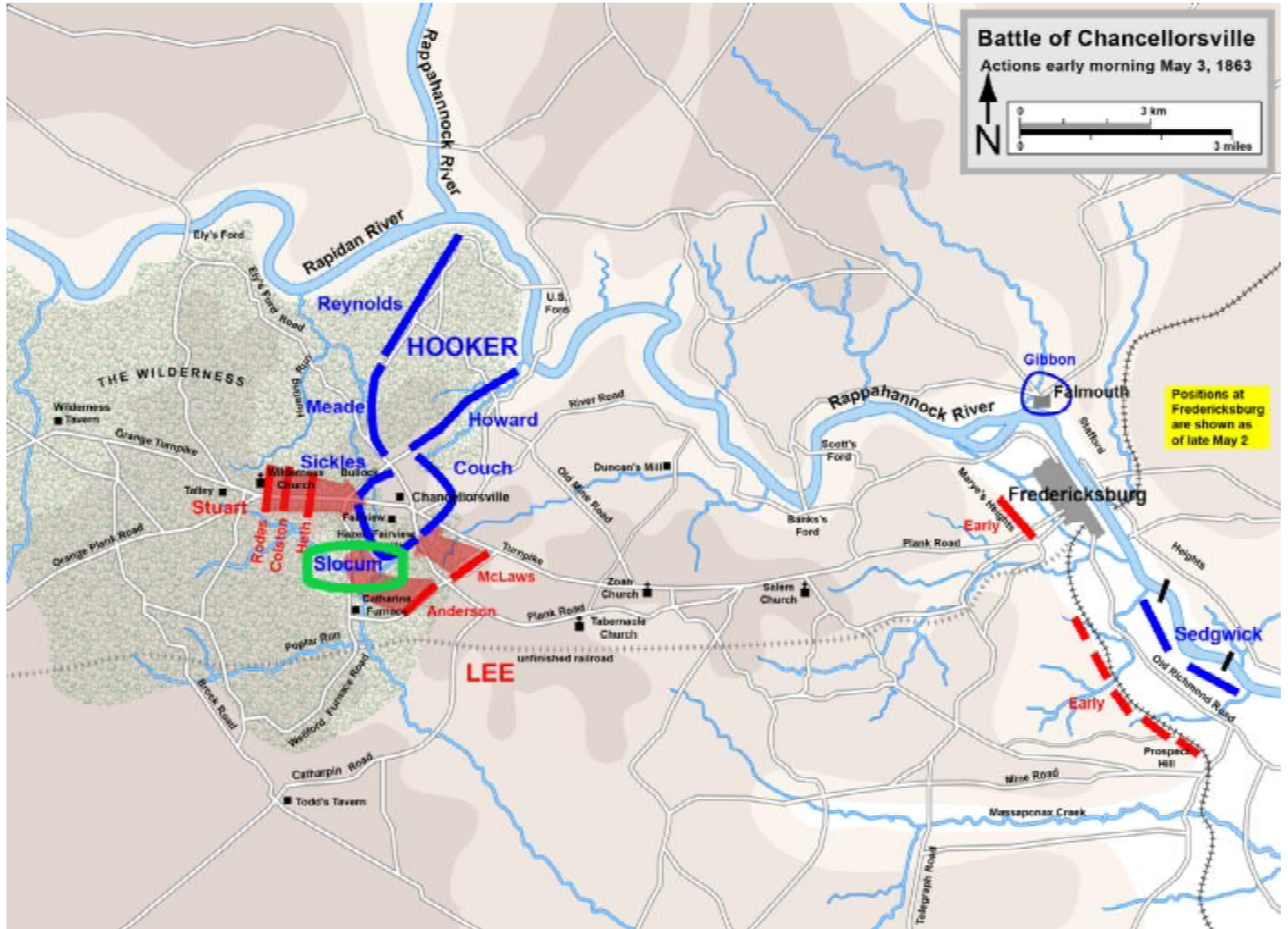
Battle of Chancellorsville, Va., actions on May 1, 1863. Shows position of 28th Pennsylvania Infantry.



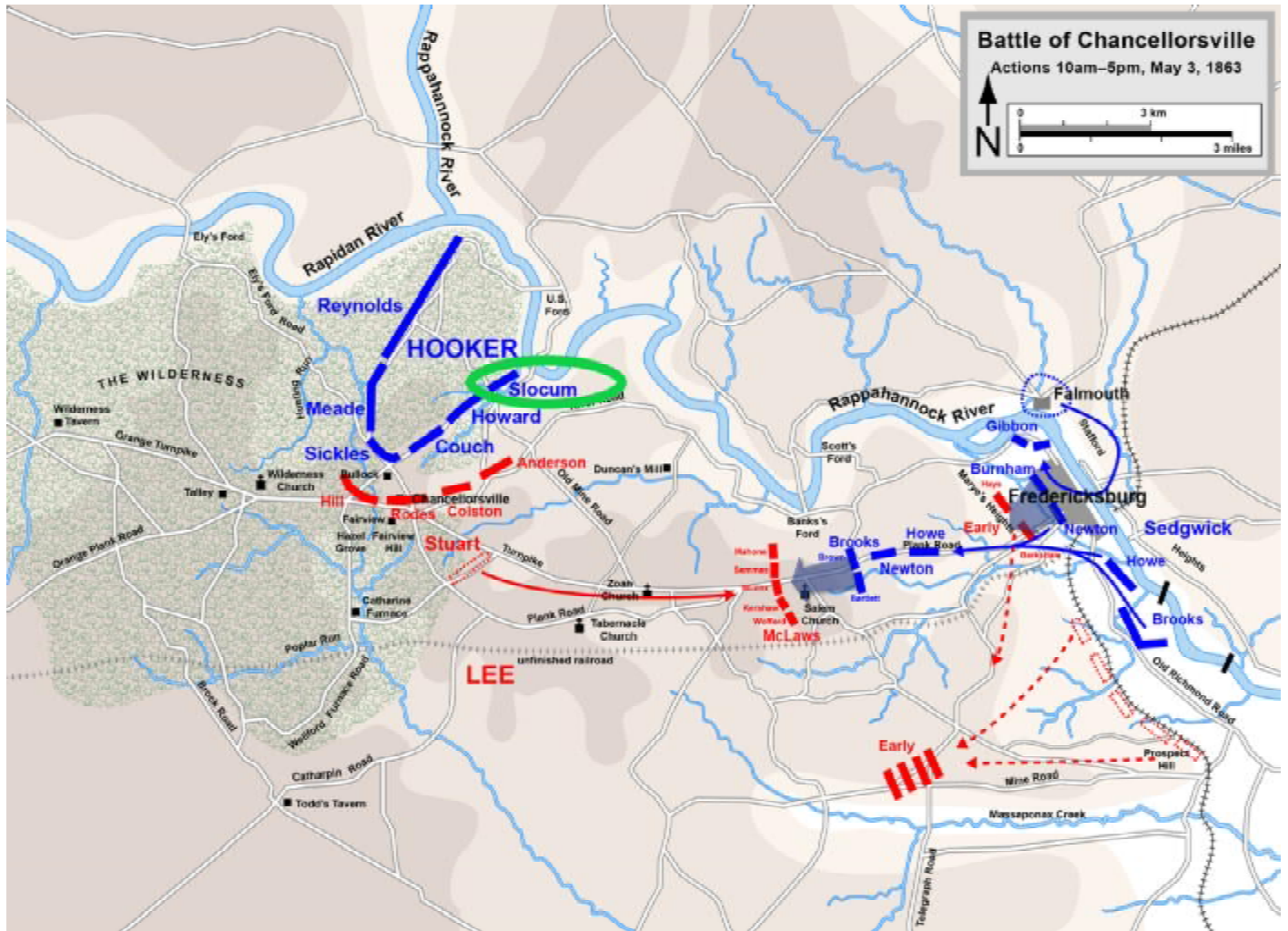
Battle of Chancellorsville, Va., actions on May 2, 1863. Shows position of 28th Pennsylvania Infantry.

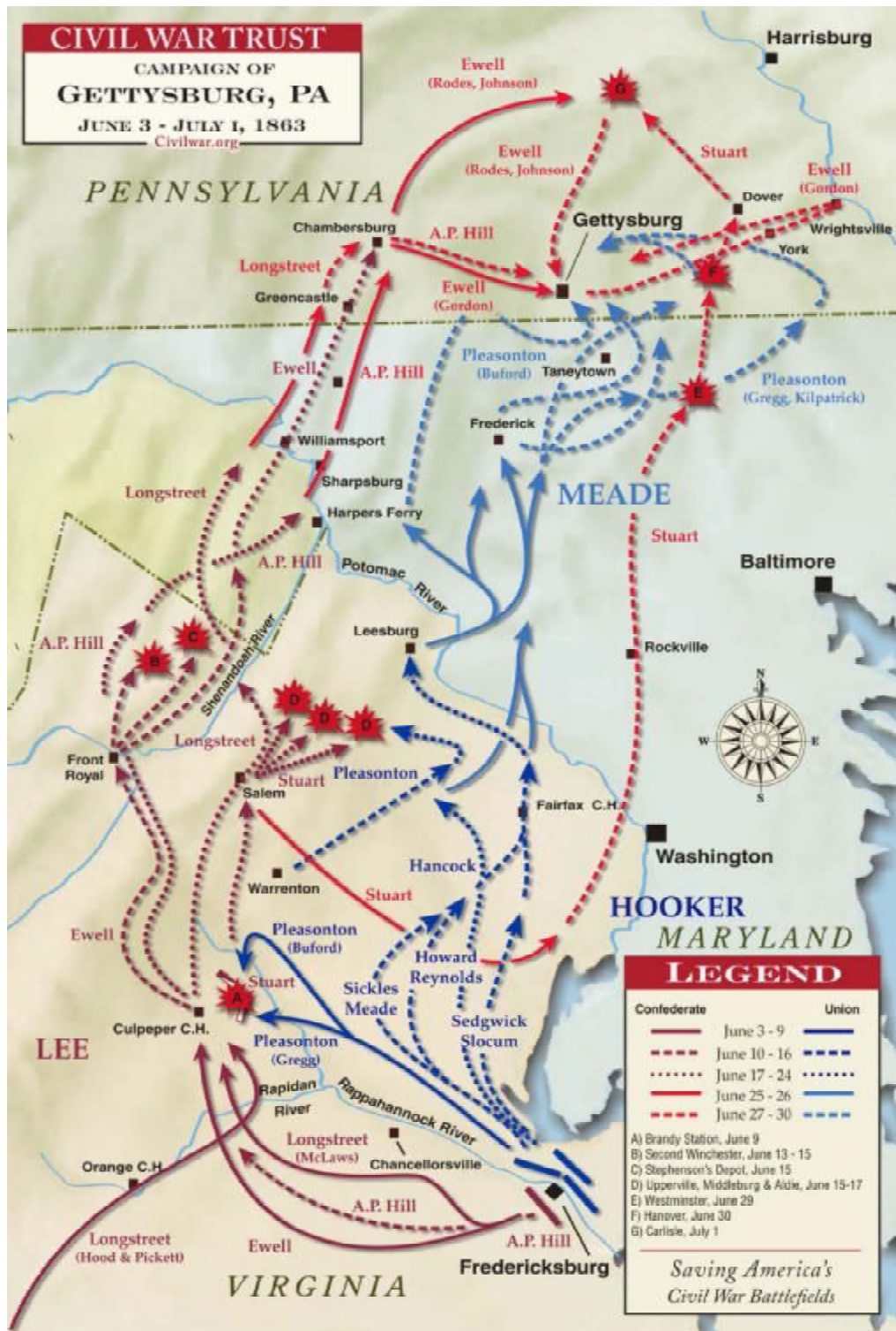

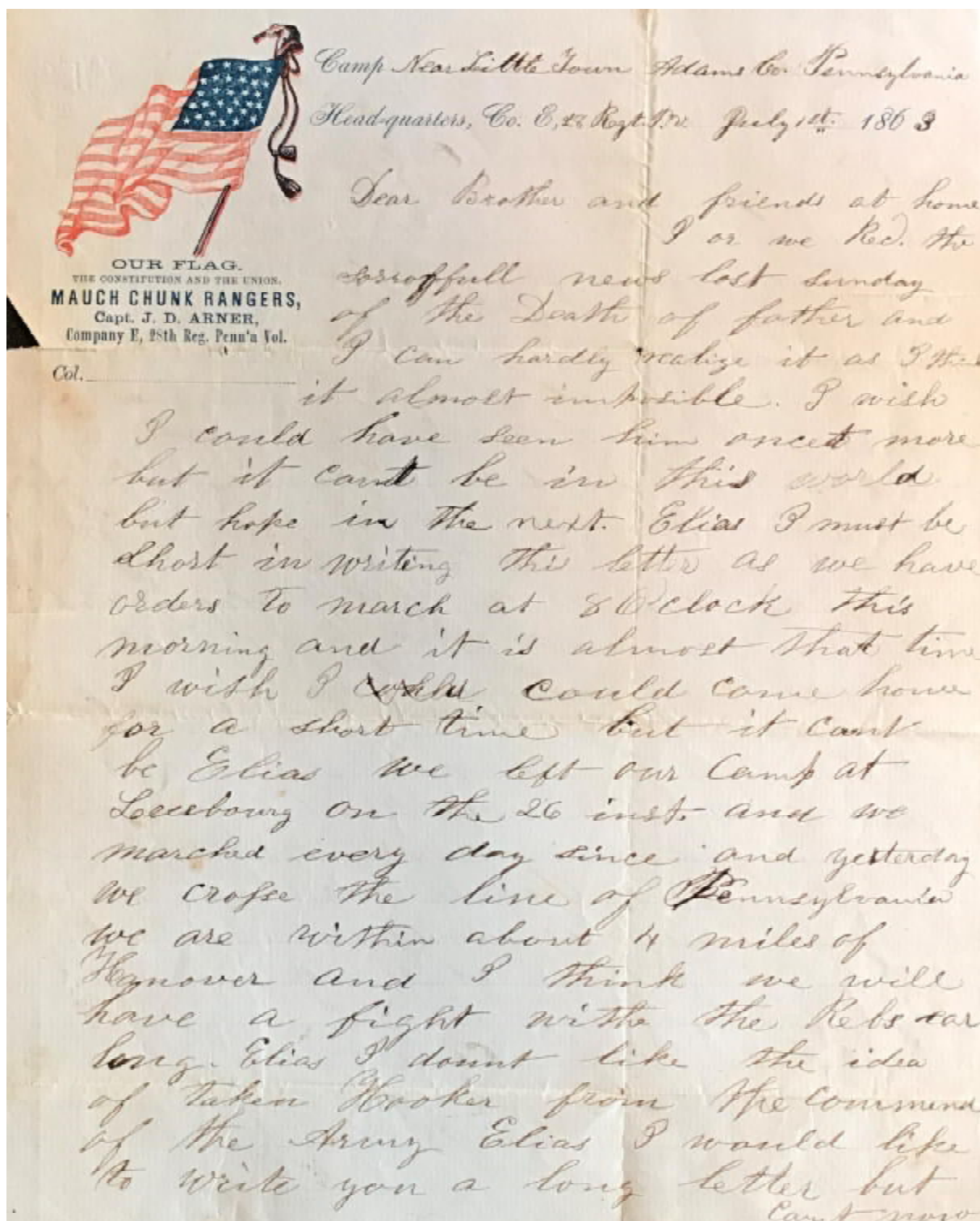


Gettysburg Campaign Map

Letter from Gideon Moser to Elias Moser, dated 1 July 1863, Camp Near Little Town, Adams Co., Pennsylvania., Page 1



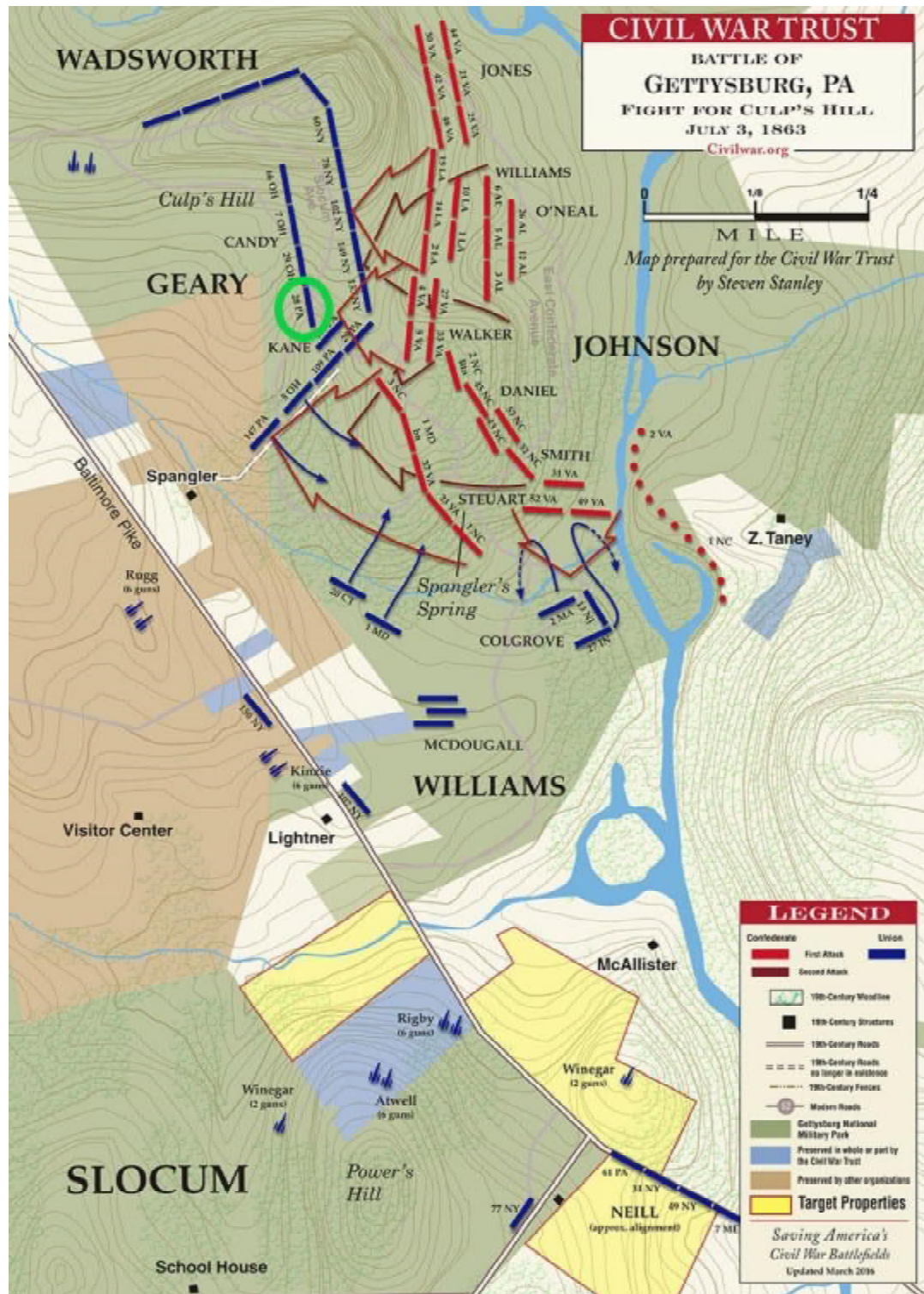
This letter is written on the stationary of the Mauch Chunk Rangers, Capt. J. D. Arner, Company E, 28th Reg. Penn's. Vol. It reads as follows: "Dear Brother and friends at home, I or we Rec. the sorrowful news last Sunday of the Death of father and I can hardly realize it as I think it almost impossible. I wish I could have Seen him onest(sp) more but it can't be in this world but hope in the next. Elias I must be short in writing the letter as we have orders to march at 8 O'clock this morning and it is almost that time. I wish I could come home for a short time but it can't be Elias we left our Camp at Leesburg on the 26 inst. And we marched every day since and yesterday we cross the line of Pennsylvania. We are within about 4 miles of Hanover and I think we will have a fight with the Rebs ear long. Elias I dont(sp) like the idea of taken Hooker from the Command of the Army. Elias I would like to write you a long letter but can't now. ...

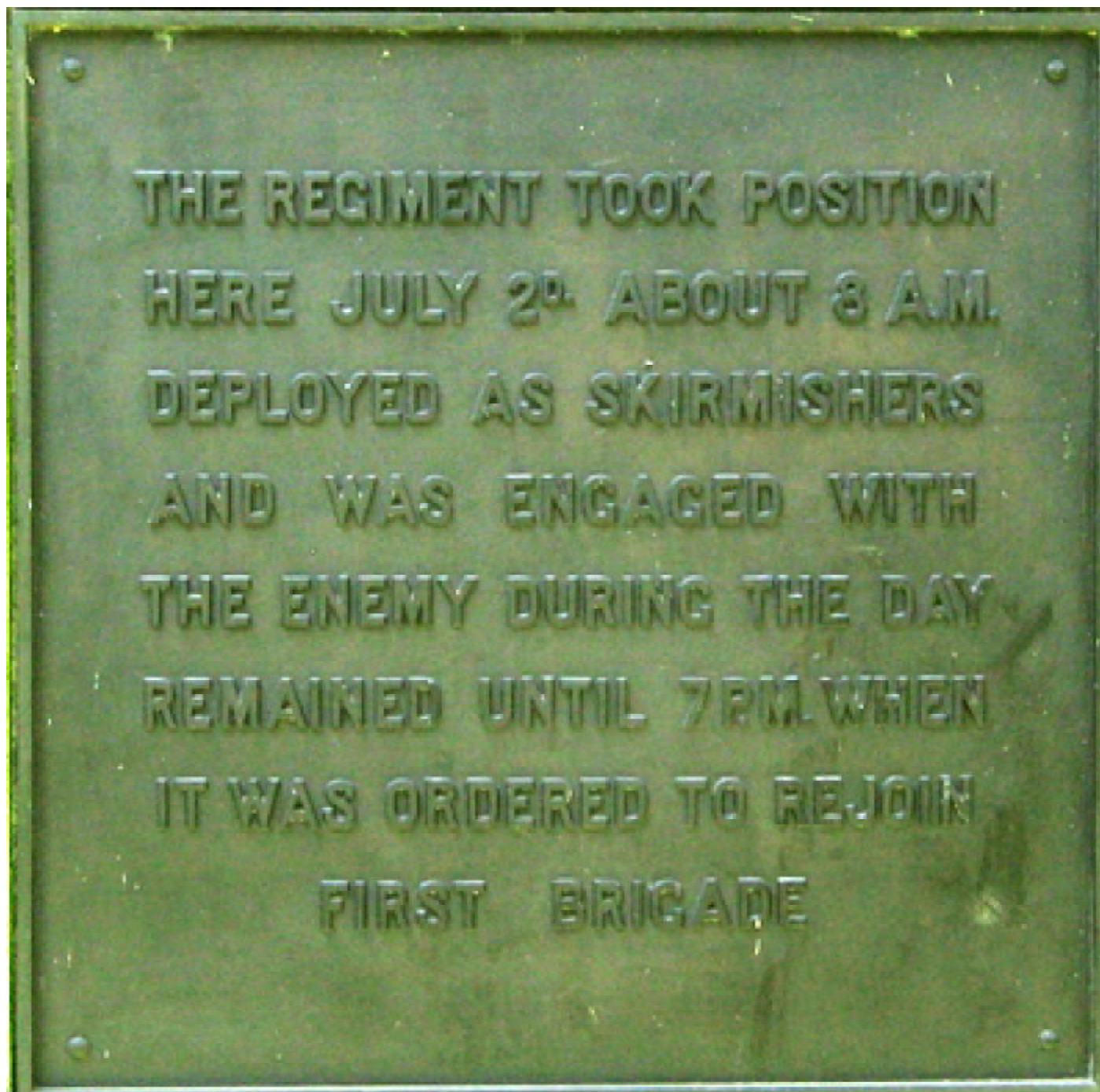

From the back: Mustered in June 28th 1861; Re-enlisted December 22d 1863; Mustered out July 18th 1865; Arrived at 3 p.m. July 1st and went into position on the ridge north of Little Round Top at 6.30 a.m. July 2nd moved to Culp's Hill where the Regiment was advanced to Rock Creek to support the skirmish line. At dark retired and moved with the Brigade returned at about 3 a.m. July 3rd and at 8 a.m. relieved the troops in the breast works. Was relieved in turn and again advanced and occupied the works from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. Present at Gettysburg 13 officers and 290 men. Killed and mortally wounded 6 men. Wounded 1 officer and 19 men. Captured or missing 2 men.

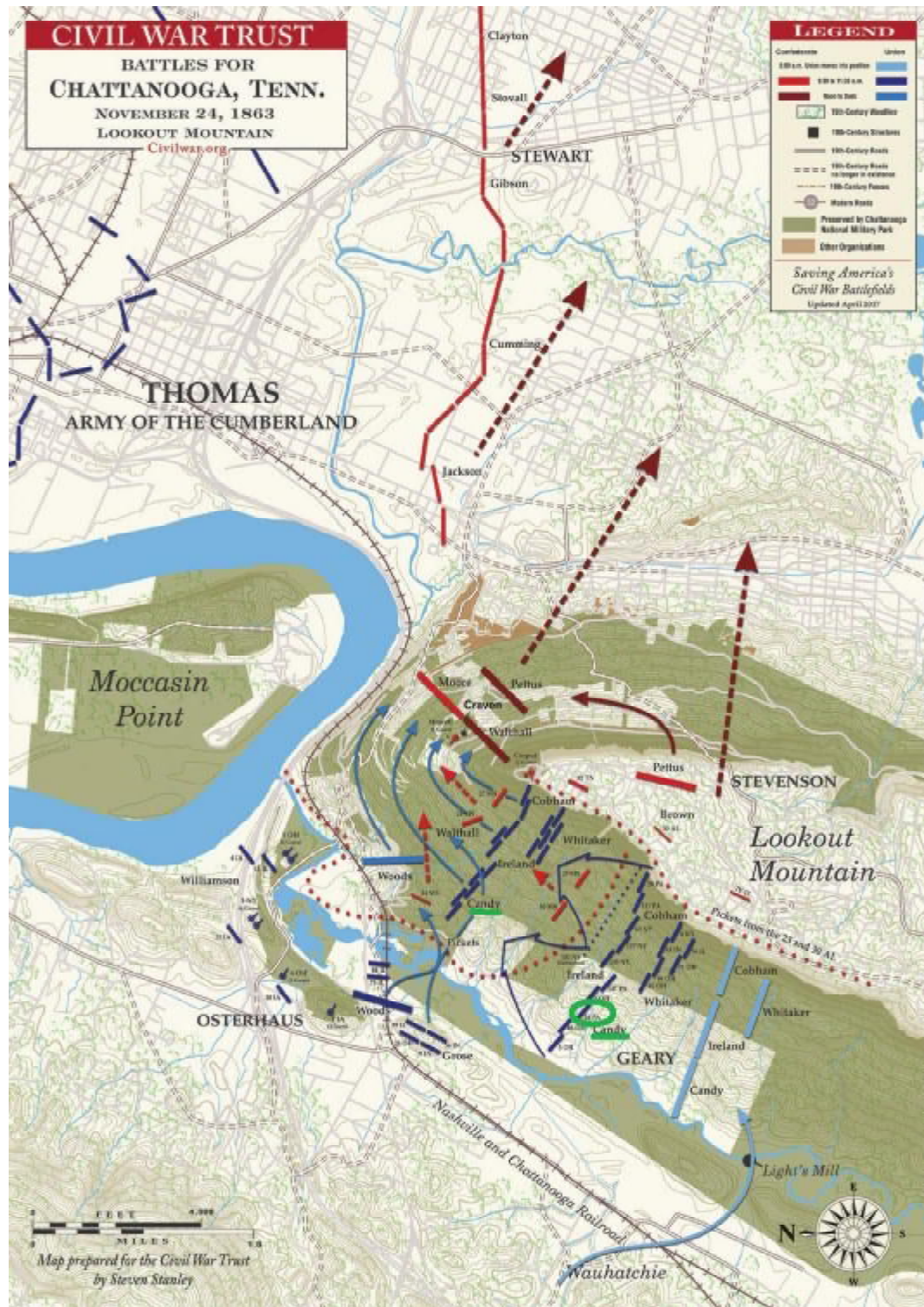

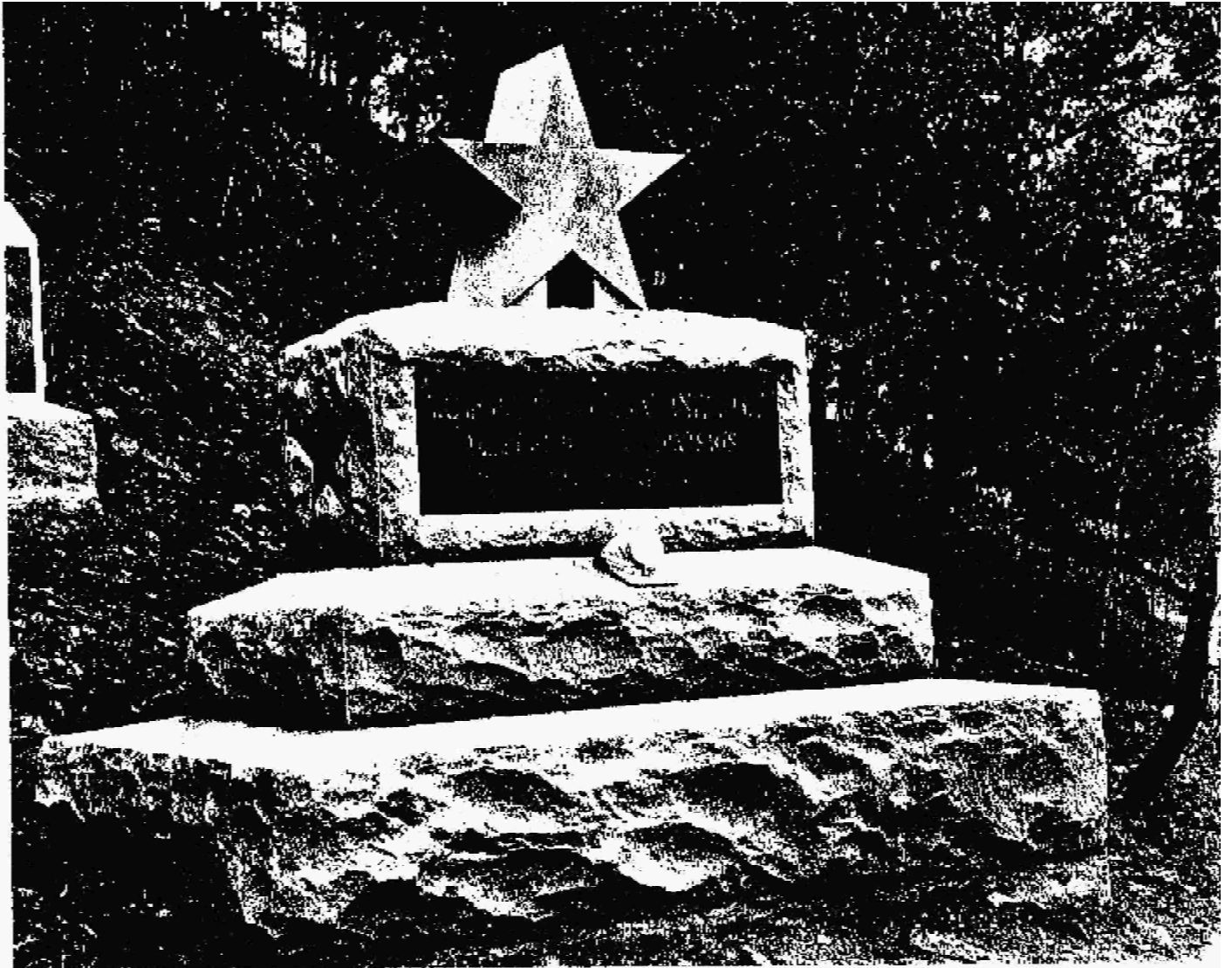

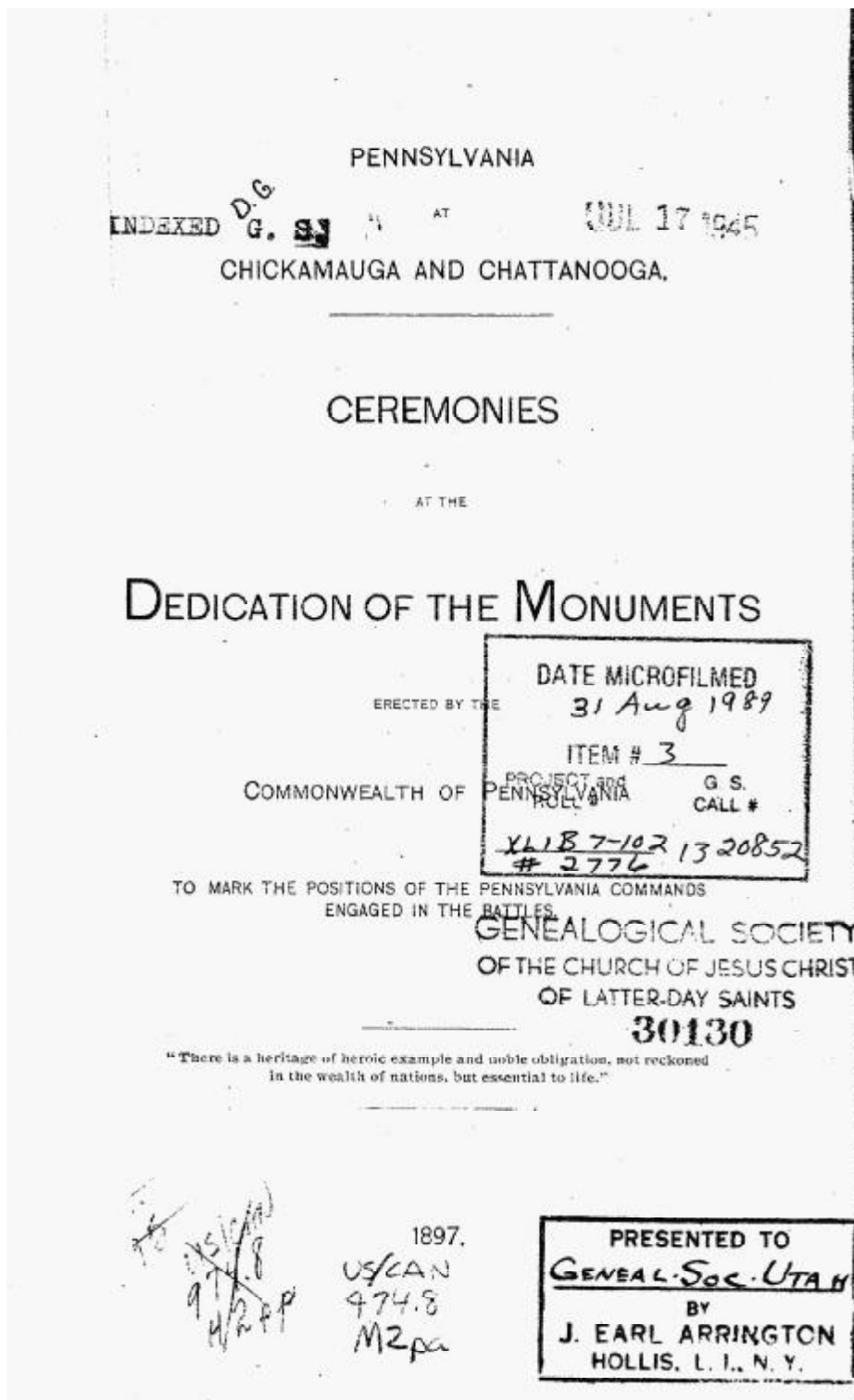

28TH REGIMENT INFANTRY

NEAR CRAVEN'S HOUSE, LOOKOUT MOUNTAIN, TENN., NOVEMBER 15TH, 1897.

ADDRESS OF CORPORAL JOSEPH L. CORNET.

COMRADES of the Twenty-eighth Pennsylvania Veteran Volunteer Infantry Regiment, I greet you! For the fourth time we meet to renew our comradeship upon a former battlefield. In May, 1865, we halted upon the bloody field of Chancellorsville, while returning home from the war. Then and there we took up the body of our gallant leader, Major Lansford F. Chapman, who died while leading us in a charge, two years before. We have also met in reunion upon the fields of Gettysburg

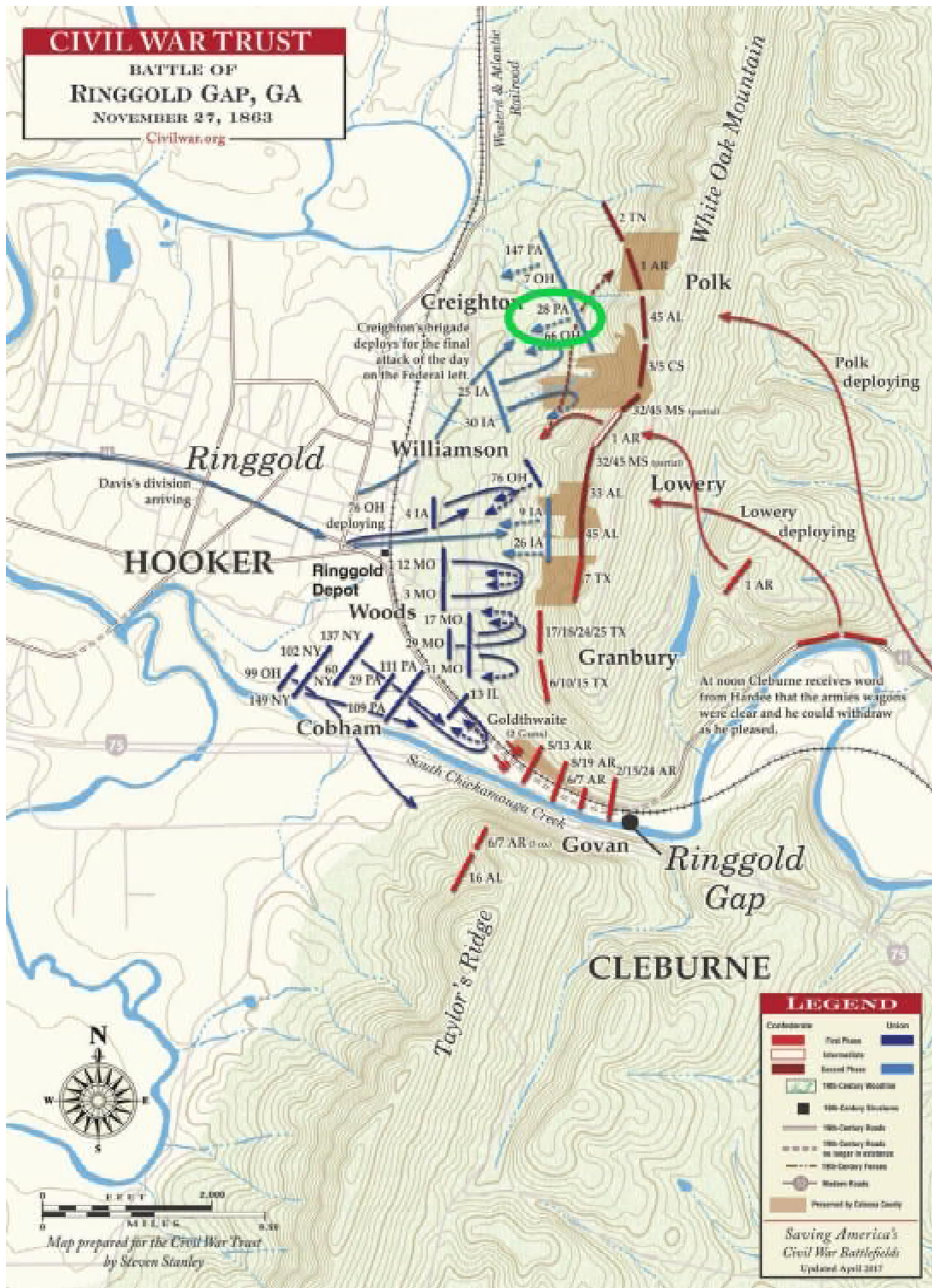

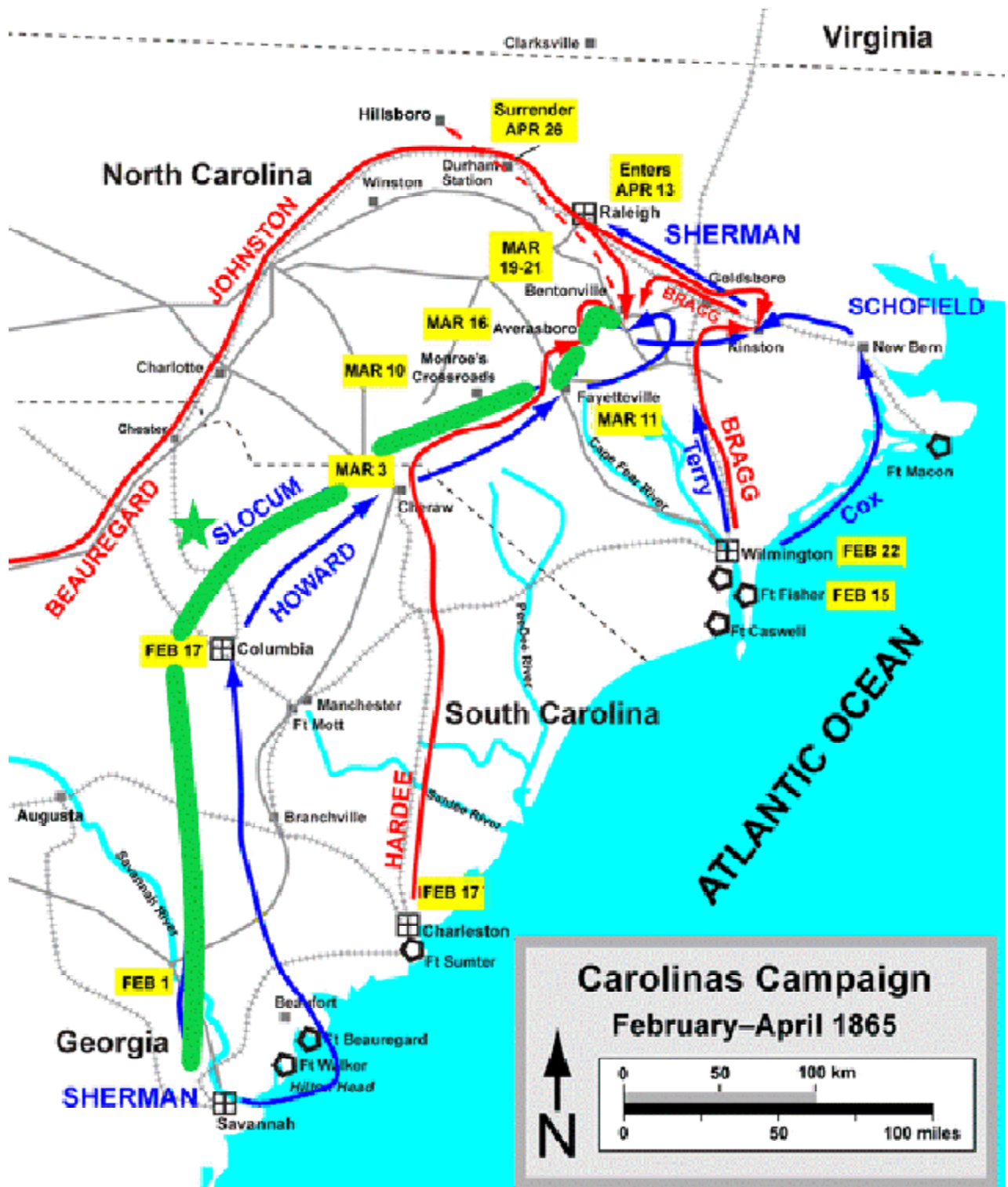

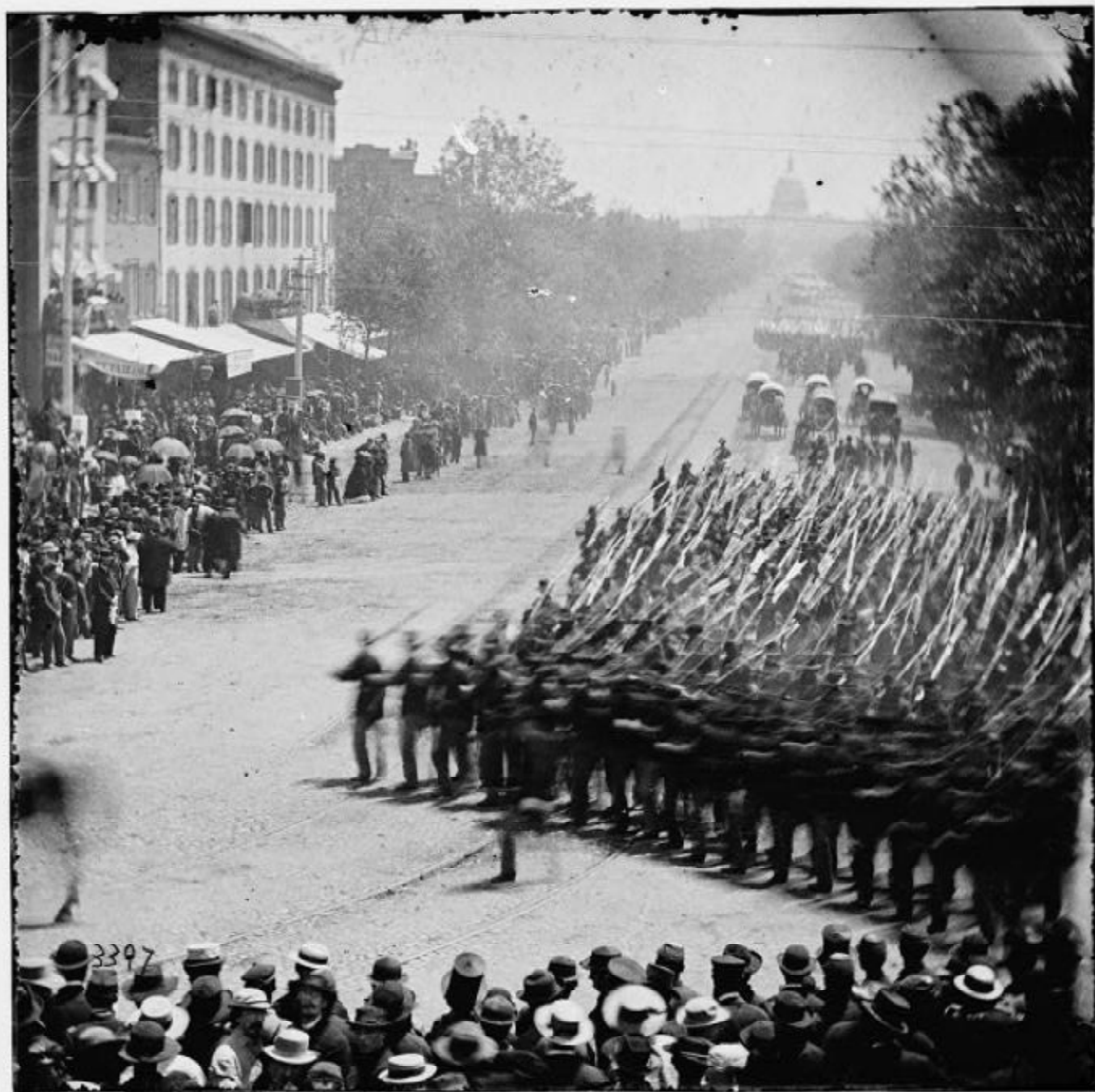
