"The Wertman family reunion was held September 6 at the home of Mr. and Mrs. N. E. Wertman, in Flint, Michigan. About 35 members of the family were present from the immediate vicinity of Flint, Lockport, and Otsego county. A pot-luck dinner was served at noon and in the afternoon an interesting program was given. Mrs. Ella Ward of Lockport presented a copy of the 'family tree' she had prepared, tracing the history of the Wertman family back 100 years. The family diagram showed that the name was originally Werthman."

Presentations will take place at the Allen County (Dupont Branch) Public Library beginning promptly at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, 18 August.

#### Friday Dinner

## **Guest Speaker**

We are privileged to have a distinguished guest speaker on Friday evening, Curt B. Witcher, Manager for the Historical Genealogy Department of the Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne. He is a member of the Genealogy Committee of the American Library Association and participates in other genealogical and historical committees of the ALS. Curt is president of the National Genealogical Society and a past-president of the Federation of Genealogical Societies. He has memberships in a number of historical and genealogical organizations and is the founding president of the Indiana Genealogical Society.

In addition, he is an adjunct professor in Indiana University's Continuing Education Program and is co-editor of the 1987 through 2000 editions of the Periodical Source Index published by the Allen County Public Library Foundation.

Curt serves on the Advisory Board of the Passenger and Immigration Index Project for Gale Research, Inc., and was a research consultant for both of PBS's "Ancestors" series. He is on the Advisory Board for Ancestry, Inc., of Salt Lake City, Utah, and a contributing columnist for their magazine.

Curt was distinguished in 1995 as a fellow of the Utah Genealogical Association and received the Federation of Genealogical Societies' (FGS) Rabbi Malcolm H. Stern Humanitarian Award in 1997. He was one of the Kellogg Foundation's 1997 "Expert in Residence" scholars, a 1998 recipient of the Presidential Citation from GENTECH, Inc., and the 1999 recipient of the FGS's David S. Vogels, Jr., Award in recognition of career contributions to the Federation and its members.

**Imagine** the most beautiful classic automobiles of all time -- Duesenberg, Packard, Cord, Cadillac, Auburn, Rolls Royce - the emblems of an age when personal motoring brought with it style, elegance and untamed speed. Now imagine them in the breath-taking art deco showrooms of America's most esteemed builder of grand luxury marques. You've just envisioned the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Museum, in Auburn, Indiana, the "Home of the Classics." More than 100 intriguing vehicles, from the horseless carriages of the 1890's to the muscular sports cars of today, occupy two floors of the 1930 factory headquarters of the Auburn Automobile Company (included in the National Register of Historic Places).

#### **National Automotive and Truck Museum**

The National Automotive and Truck Museum of the United States (NATMUS) is a non-profit museum with emphasis on post World War II cars and trucks but with vehicles on display from 1908 "high wheelers" to current production pick ups. Also you will find a Model Car Truck & Toy Museum. NATMUS is housed in the former Service and Experimental Department buildings of the Auburn Automobile Company. These are two of the few remaining factory production buildings of the company.

#### WWII Victory Museum

Four tickets, up to \$10 value. Open daily, 9:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.


If you are looking for tank destroyers, armored fighting vehicles, halftracks, support trucks, staff cars, motorcycles, and more from 11 different countries, including an LVT-3 amphibian, this is the place to be. You will not find these vehicles together anywhere else, and some examples are not shown anywhere else. In early 2000, Dean Kruse, a renowned auctioneer and the youngest Indiana State Senator, purchased this entire collection from a closed Belgium museum. He built his 192,000square foot American Heritage Museum that houses the WWII Victory Museum in the south wing, and an impressive automotive museum in the north wing. The Victory collection honors those who fought to free Europe, with an emphasis on Indiana (Hoosier) veterans.

#### Kruse Automotive & Carriage Museum

Four tickets, up to \$10 value. Open daily, 9:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.

The Kruse Automotive & Carriage Museum is in the north wing of the American Heritage Museum. Enjoy the classic beauty of a Duesenberg, and feel an adrenaline rush looking at the aerodynamic lines of an Indy race car. Admire the workmanship and ingenuity of antique carriages and get a close-up look at cars from television and movie favorites. Finally, you can view one of the world's finest collections of custom hot rods built by Carl Casper, a legend in the world of custom cars and winner of over 100 car show and competition awards.

See Carl Casper's personal collection of antique carriages and custom cars including Casper's Ghost, the Paddy Wagon, President Grant's Buggy, McKinley's Burial Coach, British Royal Carriages and an authentic Wells Fargo Stage Coach. From the classic car collections of Dean V. Kruse, Jeff Skoll and Bill Cranston come automotive works of art that remind us of a time when motoring had an elegance and style since unmatched, such as a 1932 Auburn Boattail Speedster and Howard Hughes's Silver Ghost. Get within a few feet of a sleek Indy 500 race car and some TV and movie cars such as the Batmobile with its sleek lines and gothic look.



#### Directions to 2006 Reunion Sites (above)

**A:** To Comfort Suites Hotel from Fort Wayne International Airport: follow the signs out of the airport to I-69. (It is well marked.) You will be traveling on the Airport Expressway to the interstate. Take I-69 north through Fort Wayne and when you see I-469, the Dupont exit is within a mile. Exit onto Dupont Road, turn right, and look for the Comfort Suites on the right, clearly visible from the interstate. The entrance is a little further east of the hotel.

To Comfort Suites Hotel from I-80/I-90: Take the first Indiana exit, I-69 southbound, toward Angola, Auburn, and Fort Wayne. It is about 40 miles to exit 116, eastbound, to the motel at 3302 East Dupont Road.

**B:** To Allen County Branch Library from Comfort Suites: Take Dupont Road west about 2 miles to the library at 538 East Dupont Road.

**C:** To Don Hall's from Comfort Suites: Take left ramp from East Dupont Road onto I-69 southbound. Take right ramp at exit 111B, northbound, onto IN 3, Lima Road, toward Kendallville. Turn right onto West Washington Center Road to 1313 West Washington Center Road. Don Hall's can be seen from I-69. Distance: about 5 miles.

**D:** To Lester's from Comfort Suites: Take left ramp from East Dupont Road onto 169 southbound. At

exit 111A, take right ramp onto US-27 southbound, toward Fort Wayne. Turn right (west) onto East Washington Boulevard, about 4 miles. Turn left (south) onto Broadway Street, about ½ mile. Bear right (west) onto Bluffton Road to 1500 Bluffton Road. Distance: about 12 miles; driving time, about 20 minutes.

## Minutes, 2005 Wertman Family **Association Reunion**

#### **Researchers' Meeting**

Trainer's Midway Diner, Interstate 78 exit 16, Berks County, PA; Friday, 19 August 2005

Russ Dannecker opened the Researchers' Meeting at 9:00 a.m. He extended the association's thanks to Shirley and Richard Daniels for the fine job and all of the work they put into making this reunion a success. This year's reunion has more attendees than any reunion we have had so far.

Our database hasn't been improved or changed this year. We need volunteers to help with this project. This database is very accurate. Only primary documentation has been used. Russ cited Maude Transue and Isabel Stage for the fine work they did in organizing, saving and researching much of our early material.

Moving on to what we want to do next, Tom Young discussed DNA. This is a field that is progressing rapidly and is of great interest. At the moment, it is quite expensive, costing between \$100 and \$250 per test. It is thought the program is a good idea and that we should participate in it.

Franklin and Marshall College archives and church records have been thoroughly researched to find wills, estates,

deeds, and lawsuits. It is believed that there is nothing more to find there.

Katherine Bucher has been in charge of organizing all of the records of our family reunions from 1922-1934. She has done an outstanding job! All of the records have been put in databases and cross-referenced. This includes the minutes and any other information we have from those reunions. Katherine has put all of this information on a disk and made it available to all of the members.

Tom Young discussed the Reichelderfer lawsuit. Last year he had presented the Reichelderfer girls as second cousins. He says the evidence is that they were first cousins rather than second cousins and wishes to correct the situation. Caveats of accuracy of information were discussed.

Interview sessions with our two most senior members, Rosa Wertman Strickling and Mary Alice Wertman McLaughlin, were recorded on videotape. A future issue of Wertman Lines will contain highlights of the interviews.

Richard Daniels gave a most interesting presentation on "Finding Martin Wertman's Land, and Stumbles Along the Way." He first drew a plat from the metes and bounds in Martin's 1792 warrant. Richard explained his method of selecting likely locations for the land and the use of county deed records to trace land ownership from the present day back to Martin. Richard superimposed the drawing on a present-day map showing how the farm was located along Trolley and Irish Creek roads in today's Centre Township.

Russ Dannecker gave a rundown on the brief life of John LeVan Wertman, a Civil War soldier. He then read letters that John had written home and

analyzed them. The original letters had been written in German. Russ had had them translated and read them in English.

Shirley Daniels gave a presentation on "Wertman Wives and Daughters -- What We Know." Doing the female lines is a real challenge, as clues can be quite deeply hidden in the records. Shirley used documents from estate files to illustrate women's lifestyles. Martin's son Simon married Susanna Bucks, his son John married Susanna Meyer, but what was the surname for Susanna, wife of Martin's son Daniel? Shirley's sleuthing led to a tombstone in Kutztown, revealing Daniel's wife was Susanna Kieffer. Shirley will continue working on this challenging project.

The Researchers' Meeting was adjourned and we later gathered at the historic Haags Hotel in Shartlesville. An excellent Pennsylvania Dutch meal was followed with a presentation by Randy Wert (no known Wertman connection), the young man who had translated John Wertman's letters from German to English. Mr. Wert discussed a number of observations about John that he made while translating the letters, including the fact that John was fairly well educated for the time. A map of Europe was presented showing some of the various German dialects that were possible. He also showed some of the variations in the use of Germanic words and their changes as they became Americanized. Additionally, he demonstrated some of the letters that are very confusing to us when we try to translate the old German script.

## Wertman Family Association Picnic and Business Meeting

President Russ Dannecker welcomed 64 guests at the Wertman Family Association's largest reunion to date. After a generous and delicious catered picnic lunch, activities started with a piebaking contest. Twenty-four pies brought by family members were judged by an erudite panel of experienced pie eaters consisting of Carl and Marilyn Moyer, Ed and Nancy Sterrett, and Elva Young. Russ extended the groups' thanks for this tongue-tingling duty which was so ably preformed. First place for the winning pie, with 449 points out of a possible 500, went to Odin Wortman for his apple crisp pecan pie.

Those in attendance searched for their names on Russ Dannecker's database printout on display, a 200-foot chart that extended completely around the room, containing every Wertman family member known to Russ.

Richard Daniels took pictures of the entire group as well as smaller group photographs of descendants of Jacob, Michael and Martin Wertman.

At 2:10 the President called the annual business meeting to order.

Continuing a Wertman Family Reunion tradition, Russ presented a prize for the oldest lady attending to Rosa Strickling, who was born in 1911. Rosa requested that Russ give the prize of a diary and pen, with which to record more family history, to the runner-up, Mary Alice McLaughlin. The most senior gentleman award, a whistling key chain, went to Herbert Ervin Dannecker, born 27 April 1927. The youngest attendee was Bryce Ewing, born 27 April 2005. Carl and Marilyn Moyer, from California, traveled the farthest distance.

Minutes from the 2004 reunion as printed in the newsletter were adopted.

Jenny Ewing, who is in charge of the Wertman family records, asked members to send materials to her. She is hoping to maintain a permanent place for the Wertman family records. This would be another place to keep records in case a disaster would befall our personal records.

Shirley Daniels gave the newsletter and reunion reports. *Wertman Lines* is mailed to 53 genealogical and historical societies and 22 individuals. Most members receive the newsletter by e-mail and Tom also posts it on the Wertman Family Association web page. The cost of mailing and printing the January 2005 newsletter was \$112.60; expenses for the June 2005 newsletter were \$165.32. Acceptance of the charges was moved and seconded.

The reunion expenses were \$1228.60. With auction proceeds, the event will more than break even. There were 34 people at the Friday Researchers' Meeting, 49 at the Friday dinner, and 64 at the Saturday picnic. Members voted to accept the reunion report.

Shirley Wertman gave the Treasurer's report. Our balance is \$3,167,26, which does not include today's transactions. Members voted to accept the report.

Tom Young reported that the Historical Acceptance Committee had little activity this year. He asked that anyone with an interest in deep ancestry please volunteer for the committee.

Shirley and Larry Wertman have formed a committee to look into making a memorial for George Philip Wertman I. It was suggested that the memorial might be put in the old cemetery at Ebenezer Church in Lynn Township. They asked that proposals and recommendations for the memorial be brought to the 2006 reunion.

Members voted to hold the 2006 reunion August 18-20 in Fort Wayne, IN. Ken and Carol Cool will plan the event. Members voted to hold the 2007 reunion August 17-19 in Lehigh County, PA.

Russ Dannecker adjourned the meeting and wished everyone a safe trip home.

## Anna Barbara and Maria Barbara Steinbruch

It has come to my attention that there are some Wertman descendents who have an error in their personal files. I refer to Anna Maria Barbara Steenbrucken (Steinbruch) as wife to Jacob Wertman, son of George Philip Wertman I.

I doubt there was even such a person as Anna Maria Barbara. Jacob Steinbruch and Maria Moser had the following children: Maria Barbara (1741-1821 who married Adam Dietrich), George Frederick (1742-1812), Abraham (ca. 1747 - ?), Anna Barbara, and possibly Peter and Christian.

The "Steinbruch (Stainbrook)/Moser Family History" by Gary Alan Dickey is an excellent history. He lists all his sources. In my own research I had some real problems with some printed histories of Adam Dietrich. In my research I found information on his wife and children and dates of birth that completely disproved earlier histories. I couldn't seem to find anyone who had researched in the same way I had and had come up with the same conclusions until I found the book mentioned above by Gary Alan Dickey. I had already researched many

of the sources he lists before I found his history, but he confirmed everything I thought was correct. Rather than going into lengthy detail, I suggest you find a copy of his book and check his sources yourself.

He has documented proof that Maria Barbara Steinbruch (or Steenbruchen) was the wife of Adam Dietrich. Because she was a godmother with Jacob Wertman when she was single, some people seem to have assumed that she married him. However, they have added the name Anna at the front of the name.

If you check Daniel Schumacher's Baptismal Register, you will find that there was a Maria Barbara, and Schumacher confirms that she married Adam Dietrich; and there was an Anna Barbara. Perhaps this is where the problem comes in. Some may have assumed that Anna Barbara and Maria Barbara were the same person; thus the name Anna Maria Barbara. If Daniel Schumacher's records are correct, there was a Maria Barbara *and* an Anna Barbara. (See page 133 of Schumacher's record in addition to the other pages listed.)

Daniel Schumacher¹s Baptismal Register: Page 133 - Jurg Schneider and Anna Barbara Steinbruchen were godparents to Anna Catharina, daughter of Johann Adam Diederich and Maria Barbara on 23 May 1763 in Heidelberg.

Page 103 - Jacob Werdmann and Maria Barbara Steenbruchen, single, were godparents to Maria Barbara, daughter of Friderich Moser and Maria Barbara, baptized in Lynn Twp. 28 Dec 1759.

Page 185 - Simon Moser and wife Christina were godparents to Johann Georg, son of Johann Adam Diederich and Maria Barbara, born a Steenbrucker - on 24 May 1767 in Heidelberg.

Page 253 - Confirmed in Weisenberg in 1763 were: Simon Werdmann, Jacob Weigandt, Johann Martin Werdmann, Anna Maria Schneidern, Anna Barbara Steenbruchen, and Abraham Steenbruch

I don't know where the name Anna Maria Barbara Steinbruch or Steenbruchen came from, but if someone knows, I would be interested in that source, as I have never seen that name in the early records. Perhaps Jacob Wertman married Anna Barbara Steinbruch, but I would like to see a source for that information as well, since all we have for his wife in the records is the name Anna.
