By 1749, George Philip Wertman (GPI) had settled in Lynn Twp., Northampton (now Lehigh) County, PA. His known sons were Johan Michael, George Philip (GPII), Johan Jacob, Simon, and Johan Martin. Two of his five sons, Michael and Simon, later migrated to the area near Danville, PA.

The Wertman Family Association (WFA) returns to Danville this summer, 21-23 August, for the annual reunion. You can retrace the steps of these pioneers and discover what we know or don't know about them as we share research, motivations, and possibilities.

The sons, grandsons and granddaughters of GPI who moved northward to Northumberland County at the dawn of the 19th Century are ancestors of some Wertmans in the area today. We hope that many of our reunion attendees will be descendants of the daughters who are so difficult to trace!

Early Wertmans Migrating to Northumberland County

GPI's son Johann Michael Wertman is a head of household in Lynn Township, Northampton County, PA, in both the 1790 and 1800 U.S. censuses. He is listed as Michel Wirtman in 1790, and his family of 12 consists of three males age 16 or younger, two males over age 16, and seven females. By 1800, the family size has just seven members, three males and four females.

In the 1810 U.S. Census, M. Werkman is living in Hemlock Township, Northumberland County, PA. The family size has grown to 10, six males and four females. On 14 April 1810, Michael bought 266 acres in Mahoning Township, Northumberland County, between Danville and Bloomsburg. In November 1801, Hemlock Township was formed out of Mahoning Township, both of which were in Northumberland County. Hemlock is one of the 12 townships embraced in Columbia County when it was organized in 1813.

The Mahoning Township Lutheran Church and Hemlock Township Christian Congregation communicant records list Michael and Catherine with sons Daniel and Henry. Johann Michael

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Wertman's Will of 1815 mentions six sons and six daughters, not named. On 04 February 1817, the Will was proved. No gravestone has been found. Five children are known and identified: Jacob, born 1761; George Philip, born 1763; John, born ca 1780; Henry, born 1783; and Daniel, born 1786. Two daughters, Christina and Catharina, are probable. One son and four daughters remain unknown.

GPI's son Simon Wertman is a head of household in both the 1790 and 1800 U.S. censuses and the 1798 Direct Tax lists, living in Albany Township Berks County, PA. He is listed as Saml Worman in 1790, and his family of seven consists of two males age 16 or younger, two males over age 16, and three females. By 1800 the family size has shrunk to three males and one female. On 01 April 1807, Simon purchased land in Bloom Twp., Northumberland (now Columbia) County. He is living there for the 1810 U.S. Census, listed as Damon Werkman, and the family consists of only one male and one female.

The 07 November 1820 edition of the *Reading Adler* German weekly newspaper contains Simon's death notice: "Simon Wertman, formerly of Berks County, died on the 25th of October near Bloomsburg, Columbia County, after a short illness of dropsy in his 74th year. He was buried at the German Reformed Church of Bloomsburg." But this old German cemetery is not his final resting place. In 1925, the cemetery was relocated when a new junior high school was built on the site. Simon Wertman's remains and tombstone were moved to the New Rosemount Cemetery in Espy, Columbia County.

The History of Columbia and Montour Counties, Pennsylvania was edited by: J. H. Battle in 1887. Chapter VI describes Bloomsburg and mentions Simon Wertman. It reads:

"When the peace of 1783 finally relieved the valley of the 'North Branch' of the harassing experiences of the five preceding years, immigration was again directed to this county....

"In 1801 Joseph Hendershott and Andrew Schooley bought a tract of several hundred acres adjoining the river and east of the Kinney farm. They settled here the previous year, having previously lived at Belvidere, N. J. Mr. Schooley disposed of his interest to Simon Wirtman, a native of Germany [sic], a few years afterward. Jacob Wanich also of German descent but a native of

North Carolina, settled west of Hendershott some time prior to 1809. And at this time the present limits of Bloomsburg had become quite as thickly settled as any other part of the surrounding region."

Two of Michael's sons, John and Henry, remained in Hemlock Township. Two of his six daughters, Catherine (married to Conrad Ebner) and Christina (married to Conrad Fenstermacher), and one of Simon's two daughters, Barbara (married to Johan George Creutz/Kreutz), were nearby.

Other grandchildren of GPI, Jacob's son and four of his five daughters, also moved to the area: Daniel, who was in Turbotville by 1803, Barbara (married to Philip Heimbach), Katherine (married to Michael Heimbach), Elisabeth (married to Henry Krum), and Margaret (married to Michael Sander). A Jacob Wertman, probably another son of Jacob but not proven, also was in Northumberland County. Several of GPI's granddaughters had settled there well before his grandsons arrived.

Minutes, 2008 Researchers Meeting

At 9:00 a.m. on August 22, President Russ Dannecker called the 2008 Wertman Family Reunion Researchers' Meeting to order at Peace Lutheran Church, Ashland, Ohio. Twenty-five people were in attendance. He thanked the Strickling family for all of their work in making this reunion possible.

Each person in the room introduced himself and explained his Wertman connection. Many brief and interesting stories were told.

Next it was explained at length why Ohio was chosen as the location for this reunion. As early as 1814 George Wertman, son of Jacob, was in Fairfield, Ohio. He was followed shortly thereafter by a number of other Wertmans to various places in eastern Ohio.

One of the first Wertman families to settle in Ashland was that of Solomon and his wife, Mary Ohl Wertman. They came in a wagon train with the Ohl family about 1830. John, Jacob and Reuben Wertman came to different points in Ohio sometime between 1830 and 1855.

Varied other Wertman lines were discussed.

Hal Merz gave a presentation of the Stapleton family connection to the Wertmans. He provided a very good handout.

Next, Russ Dannecker shared some of the information that he found in the new Lehigh County, Pennsylvania, Historical Society, which he pronounced an unbelievable improvement over the dark, cramped, old facility. It is now a real pleasure to work there. Although this work has not been completed, he gave an extraordinary presentation including headstone pictures of the people about whom he was speaking. His next step will be tackling 800 volumes of family histories.

Russ doesn't get all of the credit for this extraordinary work. His wife, Jan, gave a fantastic report including spread sheets about some of the old German records she has been working on. Most of them were from German newspapers of the past. We gave Jan our thanks for this work and her ability to translate the German language materials. [Jan passed

away in November 2008.] Russ will e-mail any of these data bases on request.

Then Russ presented his research log containing 16 pages of Wertmans with no known connection to our line.

After a break, Hal Merz offered information about the gathering of 40 men just prior to the Revolution at Mosser's, a Wertman neighbor. For a variety of reasons, these men were not willing to fight the British. Some of the reasons were discussed and what they did about them, including going over to the Rebel's side, going to jail, and paying fines and taxes. There were strong religious feelings (excuses?) for not fighting. Many finally agreed that although they couldn't give their oath, they could and would affirm their loyalty. All in all, the group might have preferred to remain neutral. Again a top notch handout was available making all of this information easier to follow.

Hal then presented a very clever skit, read by various members of the group, presenting some of our ancestors' feelings about the times.

Brenda Merz read her original poem, *Why We Should Hope*, which beautifully summed up some of the thoughts and questions about these ancestors.

The last subject of the morning was Tom Young's overview and update of our DNA project. Some of the basics of DNA were discussed and how we can determine family connections. We have several Wertman participants in the Sorenson project and Tom made a plea for more.

Lunch was a delicious affair put on by the ladies of the Church. Special treats were old fashioned, home made, hand cranked ice cream and yummy chocolate cake, both made from old Wertman family recipes.

After lunch Tom Young continued with the DNA update.

The afternoon ended with an open debate by members of the group regarding what we think we know about the early Wertmans, why there may be questions about some of our materials, and the importance of sending copies of our collected documents to our Historical Secretary, Jenny Ewing.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:00 p.m., giving participants time to look over some pictures, which recently came to light, of Daniel Wertman of Indiana and his descendants, as well as to look over copies of old deeds that were found in a box now in

possession of the Strickling family.

At 6:00 p.m. the ladies of the church again displayed their talents with a scrumptious meal for the group. Following dinner, all enjoyed a spellbinding program told by frontiersman Simon Kenton of his life and times emphasizing early life in the Ashland, Ohio, area. Kenneth Neff Hammontree was the re-enactor.

WFA member Kathy Bucher has transcribed an old minute book from Wertman Reunions beginning with the fifth reunion in 1924. Kathy also has a data base of those who signed the attendance book, their addresses, and which years they attended. The following information (with original spelling) is from her Wertman Reunions 1922-1934 compact disc.

Wertman Family Reunion,

Victory Park, Slatinington, Pa. July 26, 1924

The 5th annual meeting of the Wertman Reunion was called to order by the pres. George Wertman. The minutes of the previous meeting were read & approved. After a hymn by the members and a prayer by the Rev. Rehrig, the regular routine of business was transacted.

The following officers were nominated: pres. – George Wertman – Vice pres. Robert T. Wertman – Secretary Robert A. Wertman – Treas. Henry J. Wertman - Historian –Mervin Wertman

A motion was made and seconded that the secretary should cast the ballot for those nominated where there was no opposition. UP [unanimously passed?]. It was also moved & seconded that all outstanding bills be paid.

After an interesting talk by the Rev. Rehrig the following gifts were presented: Mrs. Elias Moser being the oldest lady was given a Broach; Mr. Philip Wertman being the oldest gentleman was given a set of cuff Buttons; Miss Helen Jane Sharbach being the youngest person was given a silver baby spoon.

Victory Park was again selected as the next meeting place for the reunion.

The following were the receipts for the day: Badges \$52.10; Collection \$2D33C making a total of \$71.43.

The meeting closed with a Hymn by the members.

In Search of Jacob Wertman

As noted in the January 2009 *Wertman Lines*, my wife Jan and I also traveled to Tuscarawas County, Ohio, in search of the origins of Jacob Wertman. Unlike the George Wertman we researched in Pickaway County, there are not thirty Jacobs in my database, just fourteen. Jacob of Tuscarawas makes fifteen.

Obituary -- Jacob Wertman

Dover Iron Valley Reporter, Thursday, March 21, 1889, p. 3, col. 7, a copy in Tuscarawas County Public Library in Strasburg, OH; and a copy in the possession of James E. Wertman.

"Jacob Wertman, an old and highly respected citizen of Tuscarawas county, died at East Shanesville, March 11, at the advanced age of 83 years, 1 month and 3 days. The deceased was born in Union county, Pa., February 8, 1806. At the age of fourteen he with his father's family removed to Mifflin county, Pa., where he remained until 1855 when he came to Tuscarawas county, O. On February 20, 1826 he was united in marriage with Sarah Harris who has journeyed with him all the length of life's

pathway to its peaceful end, and who now survives him. Thus it will be seen that their uninterrupted married life was over 63 years; a most remarkable record - the like of which, I think, I have never heard. Twelve children were born to them; ten of whom are still living. There are 75 grandchildren, and 33 great grand children. The early occupation of the deceased was shoemaking, and later that of farming; but for several years he has lived retired, mostly with his son-in-law, Ervin Fulton, East Shanesville. Mr. Wertman with his wife became members of the German Reformed church over 50 years ago, and were active, worthy and spiritual Christians; and in their old age they were not forsaken. The aged patriarch entertained a bright hope of the future and died in great peace. A few more days and the companion of his youth will rejoin him, where they will share in the rest that belongs to the people of God. His funeral was largely attended by his old neighbors and acquaintances. Services were conducted in German at the house by Rev. Zahner, and at Union Hill in English by the writer, D. Kosht."

Our visit took us to the Tuscarawas County Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society, Inc., in Dennison. There we reviewed Probate Court, marriage, death and cemetery records. We found many records pertaining to the Wertman family, but none that told us who Jacob's father was.

Out of respect, we drove to the Union Hill Cemetery in Sugar Creek, where Jacob and his wife, Sarah are buried. After searching for some time, Jan found the grave. We took a GPS reading (N040.30.253 x W081.36.641), snapped the pictures, and paused to consider the life, trials, origin, and importance of these two progenitors of this part of the Wertman clan.

Once again, it may be DNA that unlocks this secret. Once again, there is a volunteer. Once again, we wait for the results.

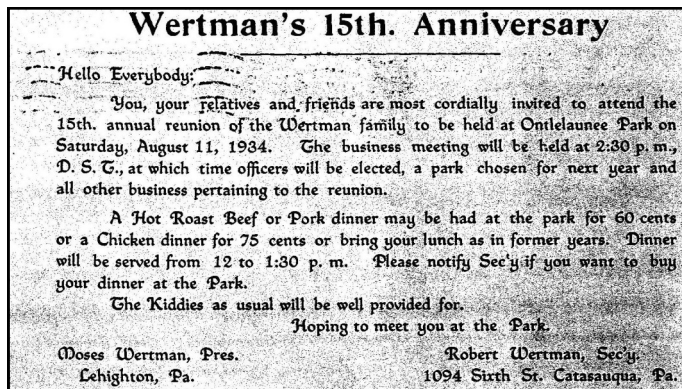

**Great-Great-Grandpa,
Was That You?**

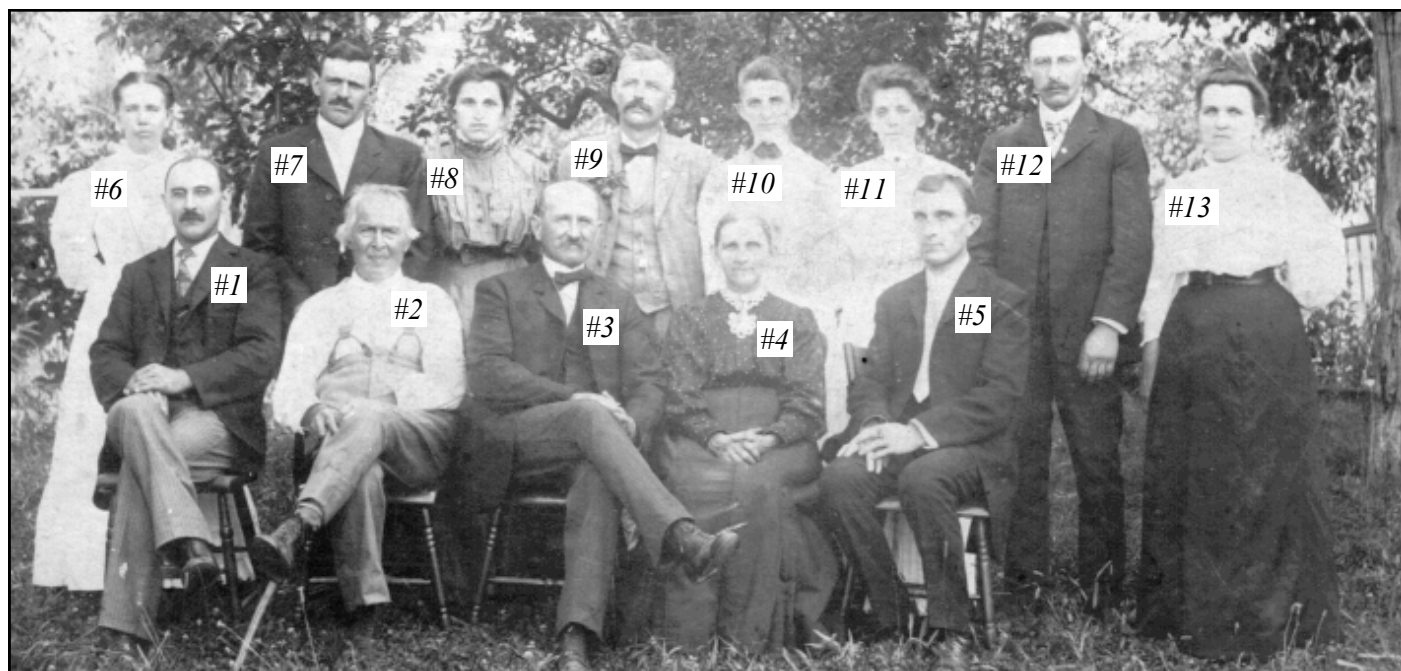
My great-great grandfather John Wertman was born in 1824 in Berks County, PA. He married Maria Forry in 1842. All four of their children were baptized at Host Church. Maria died in 1874 and is buried in the church cemetery. John and his family appear in the 1850, 1860, and 1870 U.S. censuses in Tulpehocken Township, Berks County. In 1880, G-G-Grandpa was living with his son John F. Wertman in Jefferson Township. The elder John died in 1909 and also is buried at Host Church. There is more to his story our family didn't know if G-G-Grandpa is the same John Wertman as the following!

Miscellaneous Volume 38 in the Recorder of Deeds Office at the Berks County Courthouse contains "Articles of Agreement" dated 29 August 1884 between John Wertman of Jefferson Township, and "Sarah Lucas now the widow of Lemuel Lukas [sic] deceased of Marion township" in Berks County.

Condensing three pages of legalese to one paragraph of plain English, we find that Sarah owns a two-story brick house, stable, and other outbuildings on 1 1/4 acres of land in Marion Township, money, bonds and personal property. She and John are soon to be married, and the agreement keeps their estates separate. If either of Sarah's sons should live with her, she is to be responsible for his support, and any medical or burial costs for Sarah and/or her sons are to be paid from her estate. If Sarah dies before John, he is to move "quietly and peaceably" from her premises within three months and remove his personal property "without any hindrance molestation or interference" by Sarah's representatives. John is not to "meddle or interfere" with her estate settlement. The agreement ends, "that in case the said John shall at any time find it necessary or desirable to have a small shop or building for weaving carpet or other purposes," he may do so at his expense, and also pay for its removal.

Interestingly, I found no marriage of John and Sarah in the Host or nearby church records and no marriage license application in the Berks County Courthouse. Where did they go to marry, and why?

Sarah Leiss was born in 1828, married Lemuel Lucas (1824-1875), and died in December 1900. The Lucases also were members of Host Church and are

buried there. *St. John's (Host) Church Records 1740-1980*, deaths, list Sarah Leiss, born 28 August 1828 Heidelberg Township, died 21 December 1900 Marion Township, age 72 years 3 months 22 days, wife of (1) Lemuel Lucas, (2) John Wertman. John's tombstone does not mention any marriage.

Sarah Wertman's estate file contains a document signed 03 January 1901 by Johannes Wertman renouncing his right to administer the estate of his wife. (I do not have a proven signature of G-G-Grandpa for comparison.) Five days later, the Register of Wills granted letters of Administration to George W. Lucas [sic] and Wm. P. Lucas [sic].

In the 1900 U.S. Census, there is a John Wertman age 74 (indexed by Ancestry as John Hartman) in Marion Township, head of household, with wife Sarah age 75 and step-son George Lucas age 39. But, the census says they each have been married 39 years and gives their birth dates as March 1826 and March 1825 (census-taker's errors?). I found no other possible matches for G-G-Grandpa in 1900, even by searching for "John" with no surname.

The following article, also on Ancestry, from the 03 August 1908 *Washington Times* is about G-G-Grandpa. (The D.C. connection is my grandfather, William H. Wertman, who moved there in 1905.)

"Four Generations Hold a Reunion / First John Wertman, Aged 85, Cradles Grain and Takes Long Walking Trips / New Schaefferstown, PA, Aug. 2 -- Under a mulberry tree that has withstood the elements for more than 100 years, there was grouped a family gathering at the house of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Wertman unique in the history of family reunions for the fact that the head of each of four generations represented bears the name of John Wertman. [Not correct — the fourth John was a child.]

"The Wertmans are known all over the Blue Mountain region as tillers of the soil. They have been involved with farm life for generations. The elder John Wertman, who is now eighty-five years old, resides with his daughter, Mrs. Jared Fidler in Jefferson Township. Throughout his life he has been working on Berks county farms, and to this day he is so hale and hearty that he swings the grain cradle in the little fields along the mountains where improved machinery is not available to do the work between rocks and steep hills. He is one of the best pedestrians in the county and at the advanced age of eighty five years he often walks for miles for exercise."

The article holds no clues to a second marriage, but gives an idea of G-G-Grandpa's character. And, if he didn't marry Sarah, which John Wertman did?
